Los Angeles, Sept. 6.—Local friends of former Governor George C. Pardee are of the opinion that he is not averse to becoming a candidate once more for the Republican gubernatorial nomination.

Pardee is in this city today preparing for the fishing trip he will take in company with Chief Forester Gifford Pinchot and Senator Frank P. Flint. He will leave late today for Santa Catalina island, where he will be joined by the other members of the party.

When asked today as to becoming a candidate for the governorship he replied:

QUICK ACTION**SAVED LIVES**

[United Press Lensed Wire.]

Altoona, Pa., Sept. 6.—But for the desperate courage of Thomas Calderwood, superintendent of the Pittsburgh limestone camp, early today, he with his family probably would have been killed by the explosion of a bomb which was left lighted on the window sill of his home.

The family were seated at the breakfast table when Calderwood glanced up and saw the lighted bomb burning on the sill. Shouting to his wife and children to run for their lives, the man jumped from his seat and rushed over to the window. The fuse had nearly reached the powder when he grasped the bomb and hurled it through the air.

The next moment the force of the exploding powder threw Calderwood to the floor and broke every window pane in the house.

Later today two bombs at the limestone camp exploded and did serious damage to surrounding structures. The police are investigating.
