SALEM HAS THE FINEST PAVEMENTS.

The Capital City of Oregon takes pride in having the widest streets and the best pavements in the world.

The Warren Brothers' bitulithic pavements are being laid in nearly all the cities of Oregon but none so good as at Salem.

Salem has the finest supply of basalt rock, hard as a flint, breaking with sharp edges, and wearing like iron.

The streets are made absolutely waterproof, and as they are not subject to any frost, will last for generations.

There is not as beautiful a street in the west as State street today, and Court street will be just as beautiful.

The city council has just ordered contracts for East State street and Twelfth street of the same material.

This pavement has a surface that is as nearly noiseless as it is possible to make a hard surface pavement.

It is also humane on horses, as there is a slight give to it that makes a moderate speed possible and that cannot be done on a cement pavement as hard as a concrete sidewalk.

The Salem bitulithic pavements are laid with a flush gutter and a concrete curbing and the whole effect is clean, wholesome and handsome.

It is impossible to construct a better pavement out of better material or that gives better satisfaction than the bitulithic, in the opinion of the committee on streets and the mayor of Salem.

This is also the opinion of property owners and of the entire city council of fourteen members.

Another block on Liberty, two blocks on Ferry and another block on Commercial street have been ordered, about twenty blocks in all to be laid yet this fall.

LONG NIGHT RIDE WITH A DEAD MAN

(UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE.)

North Yakima, Wash., Sept. 11.—After many miles along a deserted mountain road with the body of a dead man as his companion, Deputy Sheriff Jack Coffman is recuperating here today from the effects of his grueling journey.

"It is the last time that I'll take such a ride," declared Coffman, striking a "never again" attitude.

"That man's body was found in Yakima canyon in a desolate, almost inaccessible region. I wrapped the corpse in a blanket and placed it on the seat of my buggy. I had to hold the body with one arm, while I drove along a rocky road, just wide enough for the buggy. There was a drop of 100 feet into a rushing river threatening us in case the horses missed the trail.

"When we forded the river at Pomonah in the dark I narrowly missed quicksands. I tell you, I don't want any more of it."

Incidentally the man, whose identity is unknown, has been dead a month.
