Walker had been spoken of as a Hill man, and his extensive purchases of land in the northern part of the state have been a subject of much speculation. It is now known that the Hill line, which is now building the northern line for the coast, is not buying the land for the Jim Hill road.

NEVADA DESERTS CLAIM TWO VICTIMS

They had been together, according to a letter from Flinn, signed by J. W. Walker. The letter stated that the bodies of Dodge and Flinn had been found in the desert, and would be buried at Reno. The communication gave no details of the tragedy.

The majority of the army officers, however, favor Prince George, who renounced his title to the throne, under pressure, to Alexander, whom he has repeatedly threatened to hang if he ever has an opportunity.

Seaside, Sept. 22.—Two children of Frank Bergman, a ranchman living here, are suffering from broken arms, while the third, a girl of 14 years, is dead at the morgue
