THE TAFT RECEPTION IN PORTLAND.

After a bitter attack on the Oregon senators who are to entertain President Taft during his Portland visit, all has quieted down.

The first attempt was to discredit Senator Bourne with the administration at his home city and substitute machine managers.

President Taft's private secretary quietly notified the Portland mud-slingers that the president would be Mr. Bourne's guest.

He also notified the malcontents that the matter had been decided a year ago, and the president hoped no friction would be created.

This put a quietus on the whole mischief-making program that was directed at one result only—to destroy Oregon influence with Taft.

Senator Bourne has never opened his mouth on the whole subject and has placed the Taft reception in the hands of a strong and competent local committee.

Taft will not be herded exclusively with millionaires, plutocrats and corporation officials as had been programmed by the representatives of the interests.

It will be a people's reception, in which Taft will be seen and honored by the great mass of the common people who desire to see him.

As the worthy and sincere successor of President Roosevelt, President Taft is worthy of the admiration of the people.

FIGHTING FOR RAILROADS INTO CENTRAL OREGON.

Bonneville's Monthly contains the first authentic statement in the September issue of the Boise and Coos Bay railroad.

For one year a campaign has been carried on to awaken the dead bones of sleeping enterprise in central Oregon.

The people of Boise were the first to awaken and get behind the district-built railroad idea.

The people of Coos Bay next responded and put through a survey over the Coast range with low grades.

They are now proceeding to get right of way and make the fight for adequate terminal facilities.

The same elements that fought Harriman from crossing Coos Bay are now opposed to an independent line.

But they will not win and the people of Coos Bay will not be surrounded by the Chinese wall of selfish interests much longer.

Now the Roseburg Commercial club has taken up the fight under the management of C. T. Colt, and will push the survey westward.

Saturday night a meeting was held with delegates from North Bend and Marshfield and \$6000 was subscribed to push the work.

The Coos Bay cities and Roseburg are to finance the survey, right of way and terminal facilities from Coos Bay out.

Now comes Wm. Hanley, C.W. Mallett and J. W. McCulloch and incorporate the Coos Bay and Boise railroad, \$50,000 stock.

Link by link, step by step, is the great fight being made.

and thus it will be won to open up central Oregon.

The board of directors for the whole 500 miles is Wm. Grimes, Wm. Hanley and Geo. H. Shellenberger.

These men will not be switched nor bluffed from their task, but will proceed with the program of opening up Oregon.

Harriman and Hill interests are said to be driving through lines to central Oregon with great speed.

But a great main line across the center of the state to an independent seaport is 300 miles nearer the Inland Empire.

It is 300 miles nearer Boise, Butte, Salt Lake and Denver than any present seaport, and that alone makes the fight for the independent transcontinental line worth making.

PORTLAND AUTOISTS ARRESTED

Portland, Or., Sept. 14.—Mrs. Hazel Maddox, wife of Patrolman Clifford Maddox, of this city, and Frank E. Rodman, an automobile man, are being held incommunicado in the city prison today, pending investigation by the local grand jury into the charge that they were riding in an automobile that struck and killed Mrs. May Real on August 5.

For many weeks the identity of the two persons in the fatal red automobile has been a mystery, but the trail of suspicion has led to Mrs. Maddox and Rodman, and their arrest last night foreshadows a searching investigation by the grand jury. The prisoners have been ordered in detinue, and are not allowed to see any attorney, or to be admitted to bail.

The grand jury continued its investigation today. When arrested neither Mrs. Maddox nor Rodman appeared disturbed by the seriousness of the suspicion, under which they rest, and both denied the charge.
