OLD POLK COUNTY WINS OUT

Multnomah Second and Columbia Third—A Few Words About the Marion Exhibit

A train load of happy people from Polk county went home last night, and the three carloads that came in from Falls City were the happiest of all, because old Polk won out first prize in the state fair county exhibits. It was a further honor for Falls City, because Mrs. Wolff and her daughter, Mrs. Willette, of that town, put up the whole display, with a little help from the county court—\$50 and some glass jars. Mrs. Wolff had nearly as much more in the shape of her individual exhibit, and about one fourth of all the green house display. Mrs. Wolff has been an exhibitor for many years, and is one of the most skillful decorators in the state. Her exhibit consisted of hundreds of specimens of grains, grasses, fruits, vegetables, canned goods and remarkable productions of the greatest agricultural county in the Willamette valley. Mrs. Wolff has a genius for such work, and demonstrates what determination, backing intelligence, can accomplish. The state fair, so far as the pavilion, would have been a failure but for Mrs. Wolff and her ten wagon loads of choice products, all brought from the remote foothills where the fruit grows high-colored, grains are golden, the clovers tall and sweet, the pumpkin double size, and the thousand-legged kale turns into cream as fast as the cows eat it.

Multnomah Gets Second.
That stalwart fruit grower and high-muck-a-muck of the Grangers, Captain Miller, was elated to get second prize for the metropolitan county, which occupied the largest floor space and had more kinds of things than one could imagine could be raked and scraped together in that county, which is one of the smallest in the state in the way of agriculture and fruit growing. But Captain Miller showed 35 kinds of wheat, 20 of oats, 5 of barley, 20 of potatoes, 9 squash, 11 melons, 10 of beets and 30 of grasses. All these varieties were correctly labeled and displayed with great neatness, and were a little agricultural fair in themselves.

Columbia Had Bad Luck.
Editor E. H. Flagg had all kinds of hard luck with his Columbia county exhibit from the start. Some of his stuff never got here, some came in bad order, like the fine display of strawberries that was spoiled, and, worst of all, Mrs. Flagg was taken quite ill, and was unable to help make the display. But what Columbia county lacked in quantity, it made up in quality. It was a very strong exhibit in vegetables and fruits. The apples and peaches were the finest ever brought from anywhere on the Columbia river. Sauces Island peaches and the peaches grown on cleared bench land have remarkable quality and flavor.

Marion Did Not Compete.
In past years Marion county put up a county exhibit, but never entered in competition, as it is manifestly unfair to take prizes from counties that have to ship in all their exhibits. On top of this the people of Salem and Marion county discussed the matter from the standpoint of what was the best use to make of the county advertising fund, and it was decided to concentrate all the efforts of this county in a display at the Seattle exposition, and that has been done. Marion county has been spending nearly \$300 a month on publicity work, and maintaining a most creditable exhibit at Seattle. The number of people who have been directed to Salem and Marion county and who have brought wealth here has been very large, and the investment at Seattle has been a good one. The judgment of the county court will,

on mature reflection be upheld by the people of the city and the taxpayers of the county. Besides those interested in making a county exhibit did not present the matter until September, when it was too late to do anything. The Marion county court is not entitled to any censure in this matter. Besides the Marion county space is about as well filled with individual exhibits as it is possible to fill it. The whole fair management has been a highly creditable one, only the interest has been divided between Seattle and Salem, but both have been well cared for.

STEAMER WRECKED AND FIVE DROWNED

Cape Town, Sept. 16.—Five persons are known to be drowned today and four boat loads of passengers are missing from the steamer Umhalla, which went on the rocks at Cape Point and grounded in a dense fog. The boat containing the five persons who were drowned capsized and it is possible that the passengers in the missing boat may be drifting in the fog.

Capetown, Sept. 16.—Eleven passengers of the steamer Umhalla were drowned today, when the vessel grounded in the fog.
With the exception of five women and six men the passengers were all landed safely. This party started for the shore in a boat which capsized, and the passengers went down before aid could be sent to them.
Four other boats, filled with passengers were lost in the fog for several hours this morning, and it was with difficulty that they finally landed safely.
The Umhalla is pounding badly on the rocks, and it is feared that the vessel will be a total loss.

Sacramento, Cal., Sept. 16.—Despite the fact that a \$5,000 damage suit against Alexander Pantages, owner of the Pantages theaters of this and other cities, went by default in favor of Olymnes Holland, a negro, Manager W. W. Ely of the local theater, says that the fact that the Pantages five attorneys here did not defend the action removes any worries that he and the theatrical magnate might have. It is said that the suit was brought against Pantages while a corporation owns the theater. It is said, however, that the corporation filed its articles after the suit was brought.

Holland brought the suit because he was ejected from the dress circle of the theater here and Judge Shields is today deliberating as to the amount of the judgment to be awarded.

WILL INVESTIGATE SHIPPERS COMPLAINTS

Seattle, Sept. 16.—To investigate complaints of the Seattle chamber of commerce and half a dozen shippers of the Puget Sound district the interstate commerce commission will be in Seattle October 7. The complaint of the chamber of commerce is that the Pacific Coast cities are not given proper recognition in rates for the distribution of the traffic in the interior mountain country. The action will be one of the most important held by the commission, as rates affecting the entire country west of the Missouri river will be considered. From Seattle the commission will go to Portland, San Francisco, Reno and Salt Lake.
