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SOME GOOD RACING AT THE FAIR

Mussel Shell, Lee Crawford and Demonio Wilkes the Winners of Yesterday's Events

Seven thousand people witnessed the whirlwind races at the Lone Oak track yesterday in which were entered a grand bunch of horses.

The 2-year-old pace was the first race on the program, and the youngsters raced hard for the best portion of the three-quarter mile of \$400. Those who entered this event were Mussel Shell, a colt driven by Mr. Huber, and the winner of first money \$15,000, Sallie Young, Sable Hal and Waverley B. Mussel Shell and Waverley were the main contestants in the race, and before the event was closed four heats were negotiated, Sable Hal, Sallie Young and Sable Hal being distanced. The last and final heat was highly interesting. Mussel Shell went the mile at a furious pace, winning by a length.

The big \$5000 trot was pulled off in intermixed heats. This was the main event of the day, in which 14 horses started, and, after the race had gone five heats, Lee Crawford, a bay gelding belonging to J. P. Reed and driven by J. F. McGuire, took first money, to the surprise of the spectators. Owing to the number of entries there was some trouble in getting the racers off on an even start, but Starter Strider finally sent them off in splendid form, and the great crowd came to its feet instantly. The husky little bay horse, Zombrun, driven by Mr. Ward, set out in a winning pace, and kept it up for the heat, while the remainder of the field were in a solid bunch when the stretch was reached. Zombrun also took the second heat by a very close call, but the third heat resulted altogether differently, as Lee Crawford, having been fourth and third in the first two heats, took the lead from Zombrun in the last quarter, and, by the fine horsemanship of Driver McGuire, the bay gelding came under the wire, with the field right at his wheel. Kid Wilkes, who is supposed to be the fastest trotter in this class in the stables, was hopelessly off his feet yesterday, and in spite of Driver Hellman's hard efforts to quiet him, he continued to break at the wire, thus losing his chances

to get in on the money. In the fourth heat Henry Gray, the faithful old gray gelding belonging to A. Zbinden sprung the great surprise. Lee Crawford took the pole in this heat and held to the lead until the second quarter was reached, when Zombrun forged to the lead. Just as the first part of the last half was reached Zombrun flew off his feet, and Henry Gray was steered to the front by Driver Hartnagle and came first under the wire amid thunderous applause. The gray horse was unable to compete with Lee Crawford in the last heat, and McGuire drove Lee Crawford in a winner of the race.

The 2:20 pace for the \$800 purse afforded chance for much speculation on the part of the spectators, although Demonio Wilkes, a bay stallion, driven by Mr. Helman, won the race in three straight heats. The other entries that made the Wilkes horse step some were Lord Sidney Dillon, driven by Mr. Deering; Esther B, driven by Mr. Davis, and King Lovelace, driven by Mr. Lindsey. The Wilkes horse was in second position at the start in the first heat, but Driver Helman managed to crowd him into the pole, and took the heat with hard driving. Esther B and Lord Sidney Dillon made a hard struggle to get the first place in each of the following heats, but failed. A one-mile running race followed the harness racing, which was greatly appreciated by the monster crowd.

FIREWORKS FACTORY EXPLODES

 Naples, Sept. 17.—Twelve persons are known to be dead and scores are injured as the result of an explosion today in a fireworks factory at Riace, Calabria. The force of the explosion completely demolished the factory.

Twelve bodies already have been recovered, and, as a number of persons are missing, it is feared that they also met death.

INTERSTATE COMMERCE COMMISSION COMING

 Chicago, Sept. 17.—Members of the Interstate Commerce Commission are now preparing for their tour through the West, which begins next week.

During their westward journey, the committee will hear cases regarding rates in all the principal cities of the west, and the results of their decisions will be important and far-reaching.

The first complaint that will be heard by the commission will be at Salt Lake City. The Salt Lake traffic bureau and the commercial club claim that the rates into Utah are discriminatory, and that they are so adjusted as to favor the coast cities.

The commissioners will reach Spokane Wash., September 23. There they will take evidence and listen to the final arguments on the supplementary petition of the chamber of commerce of Spokane, in the railroads rate case.

Before ending their tour the commission will meet in Portland, Seattle and San Francisco.

ATHLETIC AMATEURS IN SEATTLE

 Seattle, Sept. 17.—Los Angeles, St. Louis and Seattle divided honors in the Amateur Athletic Union wrestling and boxing contests, which came to a close last night. The Seattle Athletic club men carried off the majority of medals and championships.

Of the visitors, George Kirkwood of St. Louis won the 115 pound boxing final from Givens of Seattle. Cliff Reumann, the Los Angeles Athletic club star, beat Tom Burke of Vancouver in the 158 pound boxing division. The blue ribbons for wrestling were awarded to local men, few outsiders competing.

Fred Gilmaster, the 125 pound champion boxer, representing St. Louis, lost in the semi-finals to Fred Nord of the Seattle A. C. in three rounds. Pete McVeigh, the hard-hitting local lightweight, won a decision over Charley Boseha of the Los Angeles A. C. The bout went four rounds, McVeigh decisively outpointed his opponent.

Dick Allen, the Los Angeles heavy-weight, knocked out Pete Muldoon of the Washington A. C. with a right-hand smash that would have knocked a house down.

The best bout of the evening was that between Cliff Reumann, the clever Californian, and Tom Burke, the fighting Hibernian from Vancouver. In the first round Reumann made a show of the northerner, but in the second Burke began to put one of his hard wallops across occasionally and in the third he punched Reumann severely. The Los Angeles man had a big lead on points, however, and was given the decision.
