The proximity of the pulpit to the state legislature and the state institutions makes this charge a glittering prize for the man ambitious to dip into worldly policies.

ROSEBURG HAS AWAKENED.

There are indications that the city on the Umpqua has awakened to her opportunities.

A city dominated by conservatism from the days when it was the end of a railroad is hard to get on the live wire.

Great aggregations of capital made by slow processes, the drawback of being a county seat, were enough to make a town slow.

Until recently there has been great difficulty in getting people to attend to anything but their own particular knitting.

Now Roseburg has got a move on, is paving streets, has electric lights, is pushing for an independent railroad, and will soon get street cars.

Six thousand dollars has been pledged to put through the right of way and finish the survey from Coos Bay to Roseburg.

The fight has been begun to make Roseburg a distributing center and break up the incrustations of half a century of mossbackism.

Roseburg has awakened from the Rip Van Winkle sleep that two generations have indulged in and is following in the wake of Salem, Eugene and other live western Oregon cities.

ONE THOUSAND DOLLARS AN ACRE FOR PEACHES.

That is the yield a Marion county man reports from peaches this year.

The Capital Journal has been saying for years that there are fortunes in peaches.

The river bottom lands, the bench lands, the hill lands and even the flat prairie lands will grow the finest kinds of shipping peaches.

There could be produced here thousands of bushels of the finest canning peaches and a great canning industry built up.

Those who attended the late state fair must have seen the fine display of peaches made by Mr. C. F. Lansing of the Quaker nurseries.

He showed a dozen kinds, late and early, of the largest and most beautifully colored peaches.

can make a thousand dollars a year off an acre of peaches? It is almost incomprehensible to the writer, but it is a fact, and it will result in more acres of peaches being planted.

SALEM HAS A GOOD MAYOR.

Mayor Rodgers is entitled to credit for grasping at every chance to advance this city.

He is deserving of encouragement for his effort to have the street railroads lay down good tracks and lay them right. He should be heartily supported in his suggestion to make the Southern Pacific depot surroundings over into a park.

PEARY'S FOOL FRIENDS STILL AFTER DR. COOK

[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE.] Tacoma, Sept. 21.—Attorney Jas. Ashton of Tacoma has been retained by several New York city attorneys supposed here to represent the Peary side of the Cook-Peary north pole controversy, to find out if Dr. Frederick Cook actually climbed to the top of Mount McKinley in Alaska. General Ashton today refuses absolutely to give out any information one way or another relative to the matter other than to admit that he has been retained as counsel to make an investigation.

"These New York attorneys retaining me," said he, "are my clients and I cannot talk about their business. I may be able to make a statement later."

"Really I don't know anything of the motives inspiring them. They have simply asked me to secure some facts about Dr. Cook's reported trip to the top of Mount McKinley and said nothing about their object. I shall at once begin the investigation they desire."

Belmore Brown of this city, who was one of Dr. Cook's party to Mount McKinley, has given a statement. It is said, to Attorney Bean, who is assisting Ashton. Efforts will be made to get into touch with other members of the Cook expedition.

CANNOT SURVEY BOUNDARY LINES

Seattle, Sept. 21.—It was learned today that a 30-mile strip of country through which the Canadian-Alaska boundary line runs probably never will be surveyed. For this area there will be no dividing line between Canada and the territory of the United States. It is improbable, however, that a dispute will ever arise over the nationality of a subject or a citizen born in that vicinity for the region is a desolate one broken by towering ice peaks and vast glaciers.

An attempt to survey the country in order to locate a recognized dividing line is described by David W. Eaton, surveyor, recently returned from the north, as follows:

"Mr. Riggs, our superintendent, had under his charge 35 men divided into five parties," said Eaton. "My party, as did the others operated on the 141 meridian, covering that part of the line from where the meridian crosses it in the White River valley to the northward, to as far south as the ice fields would permit."

"These ice fields are located about 80 miles north of Mount St. Elias, and embrace 30 miles of the line. The task of surveying this region is now held to be impracticable, for the impenetrable solitude of the high peaks, capped with glaciers, have baffled the efforts of the hardest and most indefatigable surveyors."
