Petition Denied—Along with the opinion handed down by the supreme court yesterday in the case of State vs. Hembree, Justice Eakin handed down two opinions on petitions for rehearing. They were in the case of Ira E. Bigelow, respondent, against the Columbia Gold Mining Company, appellants, and James Simpson, et ux., against G. M. Hurrah. Both petitions were denied.

Street Car Strikes Buggy—A rig belonging to W. F. Tucker, of this city, had a narrow escape from being demolished late yesterday afternoon by a street car on State street. Mr. Tucker was driving west on State street, near the post-office, when he met a wagon loaded with lumber, and when the lumber wagon came alongside of him there was very little room between Mr. Tucker's rig and the street car track, and the State street car came by at the time and grazed the buggy, breaking a shaft.

O. R. & N. Answers—An answer was filed with the Railroad Commission today by the O. R. & N. Railway Company to a complaint which was filed some time ago by the people patronizing the line from Huntington to Umatilla. The railroad company admits that the trains have been running slow, as charged by the complainants, but owing to the passenger traffic being so extremely heavy of late, and the enormous number of people coming to the coast on the low rates, local service could not be maintained as formerly to any advantage.

Arstell in Irons—Louis Arstell, the ex-convict, who attempted to hold up A. J. McDonald on the Liberty road a few months ago, and who is now confined in the county jail waiting the action of the grand jury, which meets the first of next month, has proven himself to be one of the most desperate criminals ever occupying the jail. While making a search of the cells last Saturday, Sheriff Minto and Deputy Esch made a discovery of several different shaped keys made out of tin, and an old razor, the keys being found in Arstell's cell. Arstell had, in some unknown manner, cut the tin from condensed milk cans, and after blackening the strips, inserted them in the locks on the cell doors, and got a good impression of the workings. After getting the impressions of the lock on the blackened tin, he cut out the necessary notches, thus having a very serviceable key. Arstell is now clanking about the jail in leg irons, and is being closely watched by the officers.

The boy is still missing.

San Francisco, Sept. 22.—The latest bulletin issued by the physicians attending Father Crowley who was seriously injured when he was struck by an automobile Monday evening, state that the priest is steadily improving.
