ADVOCATES LARGER USE OF SILVER

[UNITED PRESS LEARNED WIRE.] Los Angeles, Sept. 22.—That a movement is on foot looking toward the enlarged use of silver as a medium of exchange, is the opinion of John Hays Hammond, mining engineer and personal friend of William H. Taft, who is in Los Angeles today.

At a luncheon tendered him by the members of the Sierra Madre club yesterday Hammond declared that this movement, vital to the Pacific coast because the white metal is the chief exchange medium of the Oriental countries, is gaining strength with every nation that trades with Japan and China. He said:

"Advances are being made by England, unofficially, toward a change in the rates of exchange with silver-using countries. Insistence upon the present mono-metal system will lose this country much valuable Oriental trade. I expect this matter to come before the next congress."

Hammond declared, however, that he is unalterably opposed to the free coinage of silver, stating that for this reason he felt some hesitancy in opening the dangerous silver question to public discussion.
