SALEM IS BECOMING THE GREAT CITY OF WESTERN OREGON.

There were over 4,500 deeds transferring property filed the past year.

There were 800 new houses built in 1908, and that number will be exceeded this year.

The first steel building five stories is nearly completed and several more Class A buildings are planned.

Salem during the coming year will see erected the finest hotel building in Western Oregon outside of Portland.

During 1909 over \$250,000 was expended on public buildings by the state in and around the Capital City.

Educational buildings for 1909: Eaton hall, \$50,000; public schools, \$35,000; Sacred Heart Academy, \$15,000. Total, \$100,000.

Expended for paving streets, bridges, sewers, etc., by the city and property owners, \$250,000.

Salem industries now aggregate nearly two thousand persons employed, with a payroll weekly of \$25,000.

The Salem and Falls City railroad, just completed into the city, brings to this city the trade of at least fifteen thousand people, with payrolls in sawmills and logging camps aggregating at least \$50,000 a month.

The State of Oregon with nine state institutions at Salem has payrolls aggregating nearly ten thousand dollars a week.

The center of a great hop industry, a great green and dried fruit industry, a great dairying and garden truck industry, and about twenty other money crops coming into constant circulation, and employing men, women and children all the year around, Salem is the most prosperous city on the Pacific coast.

No state in the union can show better newspapers than are produced right here for the size of the town.

But the newspapers do not reflect one-half the real business there is done in this city all the year around.

Tourists from the east should not be prejudiced against our city because many large business enterprises are not represented.

POSTOFFICE BOX RENT.

The rates charged for box rent to get mail at the postoffice are quite high.

Any large business that has mail reaching fifty to one hundred pieces a day pays \$8. per year.

That is almost as much as you have to pay for pasturing a cow in Western Oregon.

It seems as the business of a postoffice increases the rates for box rent increase.

The box rent is not based on the amount of mail the person receives nor on carrying it.

If all the mail of a large firm is carried it costs the government more.

If you keep a box and carry all your mail yourself you pay for the privilege.

Uncle Sam is a funny old customer anyhow, and he is hard to get along with.

What we need is a postmaster who can reduce rates on box rent, Mr. Hawley.

The business men of this city will support that kind of a candidate.

DEVELOPING A NEW TOWN.

The new town of Nehalem on the Nehalem river just above Nehalem bay is springing into prominence.

It is already a little city of about two hundred people and growing rapidly with new industries.

It already has sawmills, canneries, cheese factories, and dairying and general farming operations.
