VACANCY QUESTION IN THE COUNCIL

The question of filling a vacancy in its own membership is again before the city council. Alderman Waters having removed from the first ward there is a vacant chair that some gentleman is itching to fill.

The mayor ruled that under the charter the city council had power to elect "officers" to fill any vacancy that might occur.

Mr. Eldridge made the point that an alderman was not an officer, and that the term applied to elective officers of the city council.

Mr. Hofer made the point that no legislative body, elected by the people, could fill vacancies by appointment.

Mr. Moores moved to proceed to elect, but Mr. Greenbaum got ahead of this motion by getting action deferred to the next regular meeting.

Mr. Stolz suggested that the mayor and Alderman Moffitt look over the ward and pick out a good man for the place.

Routine.

Mr. Greenbaum asked for the transfer of the sum \$1396 from the city property fund be transferred to the street fund. Adopted.

The street committee reported favorably on bids of Warren Construction Company for paving East State street and Twelfth street. Mayor and recorder ordered to sign contracts. Also on bid of Stapleton & Minton on North Front street.

Mayor Rodgers and committee on accounts and current expenses authorized to make arrangements to protect credit of the city in matter of \$65,000 bonds falling due October 1, 1909. Bonds authorized at recent election at four per cent are not saleable at par.

Mayor Rodgers reported on the remonstrance against the turnouts on Chemeketa street. City Engineer Perrott and S. P. engineer stated that cars could not be operated on less than 120 feet radius of curve. The track was as near the center of the street as practicable, and he recommended that the street car corporation be permitted to build its tracks as now planned. Finding of mayor was concurred in.

Petition of property owners for locating new property line on Twelfth street was referred to city attorney.

Mr. Sauter called up petitions for new sidewalks on Mission street and East State street, and were referred to the street commissioner, with instructions to serve notices.

Alderman Moffitt secured an order for a grade from the city engineer for concrete walks in front of the Mrs. B. M. Woods' property in block three.

Mr. Stockton arose in his place, and said he wished to publicly thank the fire department for the splendid work done at the late fire in his basement. But for their work he would be walking the street penniless. The Salem fire department was noted for good work on the entire Pacific coast, and had been favorably commented on by the insurance journals of San Francisco and other places.

Mr. Willard asked for grade in front of property of F. M. Harve and Roy Welch, on Sixteenth street.

Mr. Hofer offered an amendment to the bicycle ordinance, making it a misdemeanor to ride a bicycle over curbing, parking or lawns, and the same was referred to the committee on streets.

The ordinance for standard bitulithic pavement on South Commercial street, as far as Mission, was referred back to the city attorney and street committee to change to the special specification for lighter pavement. It was pointed out that it would be too late to get it down this year, and that some of the property owners objected to the heavy expense.

ONE MORE VICTIM OF AUTO ACCIDENT

Seattle, Wash., Sept. 28.—Axel Anderson, one of the automobile party which went over the bridge on Fourth Avenue South and Lane street last Thursday morning is dead of his injuries at the city hospital, making the fourth victim of the ill-fated party. The others who died were Goldie Porter, Mabel Johnson and Winnie Fraser.

SHOOTING AFFAIR AT M'MINNVILLE

James Townsend Shoots Into Charivari Party, Killing a Neighbor, James Lawrence.

McMinnville, Or., Sept. 28.—James Townsend Sunday night shot from his front door into a crowd of charivariers, and instantly killed James Lawrence. Townsend has been recently married, and a crowd of his neighbors and their wives started to charivari him. One of the crowd entered his house, and this seemed to anger Townsend. The killing followed. Townsend gave himself up to the sheriff about midnight.

Lawrence, the dead man, was about 50 years of age. He leaves a wife and 10 children, several of them under 12 years of age. The bullet ranged down through his neck, cutting his jugular vein and breaking his neck.

Townsend was married about a week ago for the second time. He has five grown children.

Both men are favorably known in Yamhill county, having lived near McMinnville many years.

PORTLAND SAYS MT. HOOD IS SMOKING

Portland, Or., Sept. 28.—With earthquakes, sun spots, planets, comets and auroras active, Mount Hood, whose towering, snowy top is seen from this city, has grown restive, and is emitting smoke for the first time in 30 years, according to mountain climbers here today.

The smoke is only visible here in the morning against the sky lighted by a rising sun. A party of mountaineers returning from the mountain confirm the presence of the phenomenon.

Scientists here express no surprise over the activity of Mount Hood, declaring that the mountain is in direct sympathy with the earth crust of the entire northern continent.
