NO GIRL TEACHER NO CHINA PUPIL

Pittsburg Has Discovered That Young Chinese Attend Schools Only to Be With Girls.

Pittsburg, Pa., Sept. 30.—China-men in Pittsburg are deserting the Christian religion because the Second Presbyterian church no longer permits a female instructor for each scholar in the big mission conducted by the church.

Since the Elsie Sigel murder, prominent members of the church have been urging that the tragedy should serve as a warning that the school should have one instructor. The church has now decided that this plan shall be enforced, and the Chinese, highly indignant, are deserting the mission.

It is possible female teachers may again be reinstated, owing to desertions, but only those of mature age will be appointed.

Immediately after the Sigel tragedy, members of the Second Church, which is one of the most prominent in the city, entered into a hot debate concerning the advisability of continuing the plan of teaching Chinese in the way of Christianity. Every scholar in the mission had for his instructor one of the girls of the congregation.

SWEETHEART CROP IS READY FOR HARVEST

Seattle, Wash., Sept. 30.—The gravest danger that has threatened the President on his present trip now stares him in the face. He is in hourly apprehension of mature ladies, who knew him in childhood or youthful days, and who are proclaiming to their acquaintances that they are "old sweethearts" of Mr. Taft. Down at North Yakima yesterday one of his "old sweethearts" called upon him at his train, and, in an unguarded moment, the President later mentioned the fact from the speakers' stand during his speech to the citizens.

"Now the President is in for it," said one of Mr. Taft's confidential followers. "We'll be getting letters every mail and visits every day from imaginative ladies, who now look upon themselves as his 'old sweethearts.' I do not think the President has ever made a speech that was as bold as that. No one but a brave man would ever have dared to make it, with the inevitable consequence staring him in the face."

THE SALEM HOTEL CORNER IS SOLD

L. S. Barnes Purchases a Fine Corner and He May Build Soon—Price Close to \$20,000.

L. S. Barnes, a new comer and brother-in-law of Del Dinmore, has purchased the Salem Hotel property, on the corner of State and High streets, and it is probable he will put up a modern building on that fine corner in the near future. Mr. Barnes is a man of large means, and is investing largely in Salem real estate, having purchased some residence properties previous to the Salem Hotel purchase. The consideration of the sale mentioned in the deed is \$10, but the price paid is very close to the \$20,000. The sale was made by the bustling real estate firm of Derby & Wilson.

WRIGHT MAKES RECORD AS A HIGH-FLYER

Berlin, Sept. 30.—Orville Wright, the American aviator, established a new world's record for height today, when he ascended 893 feet at Potsdam in the Wright machine.

The flight of the Dayton aviator was witnessed by the empress, Prince Oscar and several princesses.

Before his record-breaking flight Empress Augusta Victoria received the aviator, and asked him to explain the mechanism of his air craft.

Although slightly embarrassed, Wright took the empress and the princesses to his machine, and carefully explained every detail of the craft.

The flight made by the Dayton aviator was one of the prettiest ever seen in this vicinity. The machine was under the absolute control of the aviator at all times, and he flew nearly 200 feet higher than the previous record.

When he descended Wright was warmly congratulated by the empress.

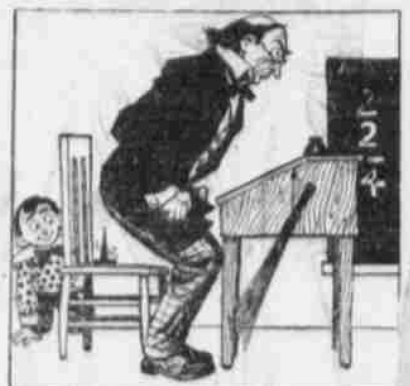
