At 9:10 this morning the Roosevelt, with Commander Peary and his party aboard, steamed up the river

between two excursion boats, and took its place in the Hudson-Fulton parade. The explorer refused to say anything further regarding his controversy with Dr. Frederick A. Cook.

Peary only missed meeting Dr. Cook by half an hour at the railroad station this morning. Just a few minutes after Peary had left the station, Dr. Cook arrived to take a train for Boston, where he lectures tonight

HENRY IS TAKING A FLY HIMSELF

Indianapolis, Ind., Oct. 1.—Henry D. Pruden, of Dayton, O., is "hitting it south" in a balloon which he just bought. The aerial voyage is considered one of the freaks of the decade, as Pruden is undertaking the trip without previous aerial experience.

A week ago Pruden heard that balloons were sold in this city. He immediately took a train from Dayton. At the factory he glanced over a catalogue, and selected the first bag that caught his eyes.

He ordered that the balloon be inflated immediately, declaring that he "guessed that he would ride right home." The manufacturer had some difficulty in explaining that it would take a few days to hunt leaks in the gas bag, and to make full preparations for the journey.

Pruden waited until last night, then, with two friends, he ascended and started southward. He is 50 years old, and never made an ascent before.

WOUNDED IN SAVING HUSBAND

San Francisco, Oct. 1.—Hurling herself between her husband and Jack Blett, a stevedore, who was attacking him with a knife, Mrs. Margaret Guerrero, of 1922 Grant avenue, probably saved her husband's life by receiving the stab intended for Guerrero in her own body.

The blade penetrated through her arm, severing the tendons. Before the blood gushing from the dangerous wound could be stopped the woman nearly bled to death.

Guerrero, who is a seaman recently returned from Alaska. Today Blett attempted to collect a bill owed him by Guerrero. The men became angry, blows were exchanged, and Blett drew his knife.

The police are looking for Blett, who fled after wounding Mrs. Guerrero.

Has Final Papers

Moritz Klingor, of this city, has just taken out his second papers as a citizen. He has had his first papers since 1874, and, under the general custom prevailing all over the country, Mr. Klingor has voted on his first papers. The new naturalization laws require that foreign-born citizens take out their second papers.

THE LIONS GOT THIS THISBE

Young Woman Deliberately Sticks Her Head Into a cage of Lions and Is Torn to Pieces.

Paris, Oct. 1.—Following a quarrel with her sweetheart who is a lion tamer in a local theatre, in which three lions are introduced in a melodrama, a beautiful young woman committed suicide in a frightful manner, when she went behind the scene. Wild with rage at this interruption, the animals landed blow after blow with their claws upon the unfortunate, and when they had finished had torn her head and breast to pieces.

The roar of the enraged animals, added to the woman's screams, caused a panic in the theatre, and the drop curtain had to be lowered before any semblance of order was restored.

LEAVES PULPIT GIVES REASON

Says "If He Preaches Truth He Will Be Condemning the Lives of His Congregation."

Lawrence, Kas., Oct. 1.—Declaring that the average minister lives a lie every day of his life, to avoid offending influential members of his congregation, and that it is almost impossible for a minister of the gospel to live an honest life, Rev. D. H. Carrick has resigned the pastorate of the Christian church here, to become a street car conductor.

Kansas ministers are furious at Rev. Carrick's statements, and today are declaring that his utterances are absurd.

In a statement given out here today the minister said:

"I do not believe that a modern preacher can live an honest life. If he preaches the truth he will be condemning the lives of most of his congregation, and this will be sure to offend them. Instead of preaching his convictions, the minister must avoid saying anything that will injure the feelings of his church members."

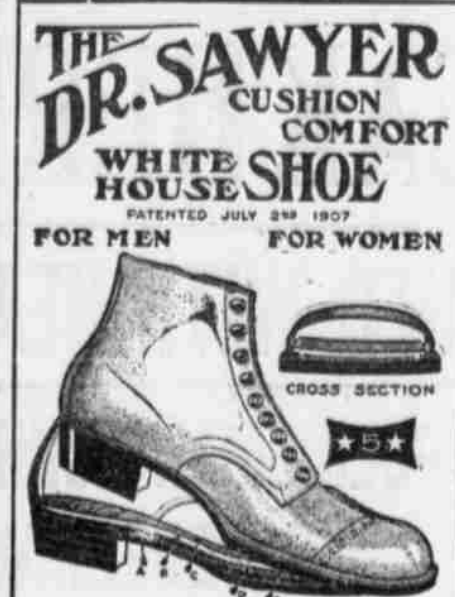
