AT SEATTLE
GRAFTERS**Fair Management Refused to
Give Out Line of March
—Parade is Through
Empty Streets.[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE]
Seattle, Wash., Oct. 1.—President Taft and the exposition management have had a warm exchange of remarks over the publishing the presidential line of march through the streets of Seattle. The exposition officials refused at first to give the

route to the newspapers, in order, it is hinted, to force the people who desired to see the President to pay their attention to the fair grounds to enjoy that privilege. As a result the Taft processions have been made through comparatively deserted streets. Finally President Taft gave orders to his military aide, Captain Butte, to cause the newspapers to print his itinerary about the city at any cost, and without regard to whether the exposition people liked it or not. Today the papers have the route mapped out on their first pages, and the President was greeted with good sized crowds.

Today's program began with an automobile ride through the downtown streets, at the conclusion of which the President was driven to the exposition, where he reviewed the live stock parade in the stadium and made a short address to the stockmen.

At 11 o'clock President Taft left the exposition for the Seattle Golf and

Country Club, where he engaged in his favorite recreation, his opponent on the links being H. C. Henry. At 12:30 a luncheon was served in the Country Club's house, at which a few selected guests sat down with the President. After this Mr. Taft rested quietly for several hours.

At 4 o'clock this afternoon the presidential party will board the private yacht of Chester Thorne and proceed to Tacoma, arriving at that city about 5:30. The torpedo boat destroyer Peary, in command of Captain Larimer, will convey the yacht to Tacoma.
