MASSACRED SPANISH SOLDIERS

[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE.]
Melilla, Oct. 1.—The Spanish troops received a serious setback today in their effort to subdue the rebellious Riff tribesmen, when 200 Dons, under the command of General Diaz, were annihilated by a determined band of Moors near Selwan, General Vicaris being among those killed.

They were caught in a trap by the wily Moors when the main body of the Spanish troops abandoned Mount Gargun.

Convinced that the rebellion was practically over, the Dons expected little opposition, if any, on the part of the tribesmen.

Early today the Spanish leaders went their advance column, 200 strong ahead of the main body of the army on a scouting expedition. They wished to determine the exact position and strength of the seemingly passive Moors.

The advance column was several miles ahead of the army, marching along the ridges near Zelwan. Until this time they had met with absolutely no opposition from the Moors.

Suddenly they swooped down on them, and the Spaniards were caught like rats in a trap.

Before the main body of the army could rush to their assistance the advance column was entirely wiped out.

This action on the part of the tribesmen had the effect of changing the plans of the Spanish leader, and he has decided, for a time at least, not to abandon the peninsula and its fortifications.

Tribesmen Are Gathering.

Paris, Oct. 1.—It is reported here that a band of Moroccan tribesmen are gathering at Tazzat for a concerted attack upon the Spanish troops at Melilla. Hundreds are said to be coming in from the interior to join in the attack on the city and the Dons.

FELL FROM CORNICE ON STATE HOUSE

Albert Newsome, an employee of the Pacific Electric and Engineering company, fell 20 feet late yesterday afternoon from an inside cornice in the state capitol building, where he

was adjusting some electric lights, to the floor below, the fall fracturing his skull and breaking both wrists and up to a late hour this afternoon physicians have very little hope of his recovery.

Newsome was wiring the top of the three-foot cornice, which circles the inside of the capitol dome above the third floor, getting ready for the incandescent lights which are to be installed, when he called for more wire. His brother-in-law, who was working on the floor below him, picked up a small coil of wire and threw it up to Newsome, who made a grab for it. In some manner he lost his footing and slipped off the cornice, plunging head first to the hard floor below.

The injured man is 25 years of age and a resident of Portland. He has a wife whom he married but a short time ago in Portland, where his parents also reside.

WISCONSIN MAN JOLTS BALLINGER

Madison, Wis., Oct. 1.—"Ballinger must go," is the burden of an editorial in Senator LaFollette's magazine this week, in which regarding the secretary of the interior he said: "The reclamation of the arid lands of the West is one of the greatest Roosevelt policies. Not reclamation by 'big business' but 'by big people.' In seven years the reclamation service has reclaimed and opened to homesteaders over a million acres of heretofore arid land, and there was no graft and no rake-off for 'big business.' It is just the people redeeming the deserts for themselves with their own capital."

"The President proclaims his loyalty to the Roosevelt policies. We do not question the President's sincerity in his repeated pledges."

"But we condemn heartily those whose official conduct places the President in the constant necessity of reassuring the people of his loyalty to these policies. The chief of these official malefactors is Ballinger. While the President is pledged to loyalty to the Roosevelt policies,

Ballinger is overturning them whenever it is in his power.

"If Ballinger will serve the interests," let him do it in private employment."
