## BRUTALLY MURDERED HIS WIFE

Oakland, Cal., Oct. 1.—John Henry Manrow, a former railroad employe, today shot and killed his wife, as she was fleeing from him with the 3-year-old son of her daughter in her arms, and then sent a bullet through his brain, inflicting a mortal wound.

The Manrows had been separated two months, and the woman was living with her sister, Mrs. William Walsh, at 555 Eighth street. The husband called last night, and begged a farewell interview, saying he was going to Arizona.

Mrs. Manrow was afraid to see him, and when he was refused admittance, he went away uttering threats.

Early today he returned to the house and knocked at the front door. When he found the door was locked, he kicked it and threw his weight against it until he broke the lock.

The terrified woman within had fled to the dining room, and locked the door behind them. Manrow rushed against that door also, and beat upon it until it gave way before his blows.

The woman fled through the kitchen, and Mrs. Walsh succeeded in climbing over a fence into the premises of a blacksmith shop, where she hoped to get aid from the men at work.

Mrs. Manrow had picked up the small son of Mrs. Walsh and fled also to the back yard. She turned to one side, and started through a narrow passageway leading to the street, when her husband came up behind her.

With the child in her arms, Mrs. Manrow was attempting to open the gate, when her husband fired at close range.

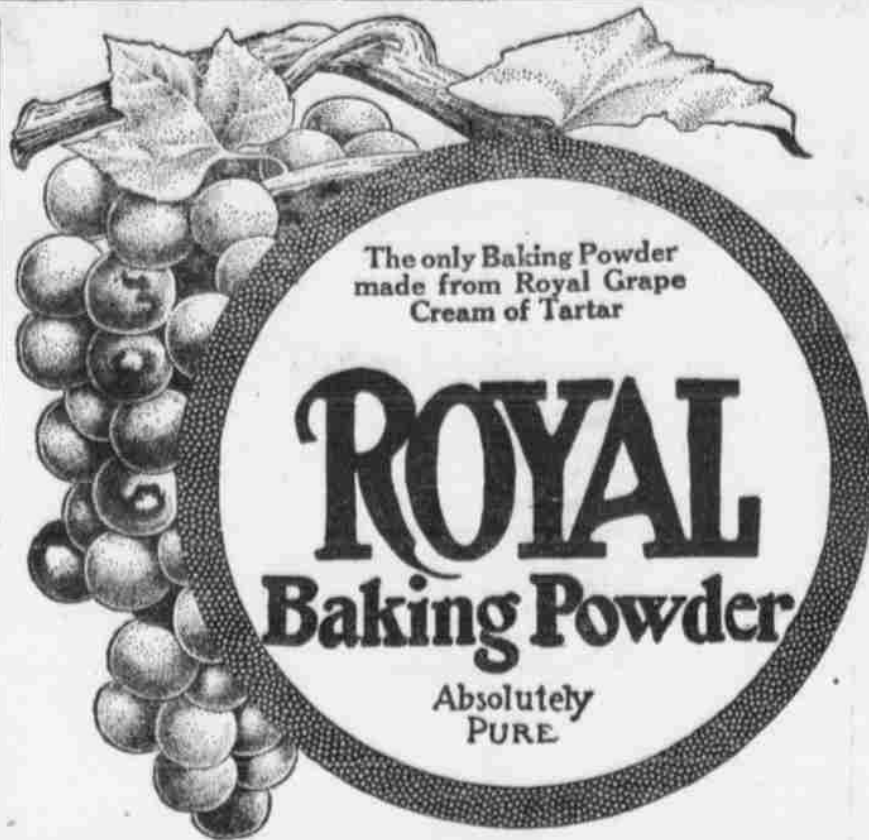
The bullet entered the woman's right ear and passed upward through the brain. She fell backward, and the screaming baby rolled, sprawling along the passageway until it was almost under the murderer's feet.

The man, evidently insane with rage and jealousy and drink, however, did not notice the child. He turned his revolver upon himself; sent a bullet into his right temple and fell beside his wife.

When the men from the blacksmith shop arrived, the little boy had struggled to his feet, his hands and face covered with blood. For a time it was thought that he had been injured also, but examination showed that he was not hurt.

Manrow was taken to a hospital in a dying condition. His wife succumbed in the ambulance.

The man had been out of work for some time. He had grown up children by a former wife, but none of



the murdered woman, whom he married six years ago. They had quarreled frequently. It is said that he had been trying to force her to support him with money she made by taking in roomers, in partnership with her sister.
