Vera Cruz, Mex., Oct. 4.—While four men made frantic attempts to save her from the terrific jaws of man-eating sharks, Juanita Paz, a young Mexican girl, was seized and torn to pieces by the sea terrors to day near the mouth of the Puerto river.

The girl had ventured into the current of the river in a light skiff, although she was warned not to attempt the stream as it was shark infested.

Suddenly her skiff was surrounded by half a dozen hungry sharks. She dropped her oars and screamed for help. Four men came to her rescue, but before they could reach her one of the terrific monsters came up underneath the boat, upsetting it, and throwing her into the river.

She tried desperately to hold on to the sides of the overturned boat until help arrived.

The men had nearly reached the screaming girl when a large shark was seen to cut through the water

and turn on its side. The next instant the powerful jaws of the creature fastened themselves on the body of the girl and disappeared under the water.
