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DISCOVERS FOUNTAIN OF YOUTH

Prof. Elie Melchnikoff Thinks
He Has Found It In the
Larger Human In-
testines.

BASIS IS SOUR MILK

WILL CONTROL THE INNER-MAN
AND PREVENT THE ATTACKS
OF ALL KINDS OF MICROBES.
MEMBERS OF HIS OWN HOUSE-
HOLD CAUSE DISEASE.

Paris, Oct. 6.—I have just come from the "life prolonging plant," presided over by Professor Elie Melchnikoff. It is the Pasteur Institute, where Melchnikoff is now working on the greatest of all his discoveries, an antidote to counteract the influence of putrefaction in the large intestines, to which the professor attributes the majority of human ills. It was announced recently that Melchnikoff has perfected his discovery, which will soon startle the world. This statement was premature, however, but it was on the right track. The professor has

strong hopes of finding the sought-for germicide, but it will be some time, in the event that success finally rewards him before the "fountain of youth" becomes available commercially.

Regarding the discovery, which is an enlargement of his theory of destructive qualities of lacto-bacillus, the professor believes that his new preparation, when perfected, will destroy the food germs that wear out the intestines and kill the germs originating from the large intestines. In speaking of his work, the professor said:

"My first discovery was the simplest thing in the world. I took ordinary milk, sterilized it and added the bacilli known as bulgari, which soured the milk in 24 hours.

The milk was then ordinary sour milk, except that it did not contain many species of bacilli. It contained only the bacilli which destroys the harmful germs taken with food."

Efforts to induce Melchnikoff to commit himself regarding his later discovery, which medical men concede will be the greatest boon ever offered to mankind, proved futile. He said:

"Wait and see. I think that I soon will be able to announce definite results, and have every reason to believe that they will be all that I now hope for.

GOING TO VISIT THE YOSEMITE

President Leaves San Fran-
cisco This Morning for the
Big Trees and the
Hetch Hetchy.

PLEASED WITH VISIT

JOHN MUIR WILL PILOT HIM
THROUGH THE BEAUTIFUL
VALLEY—GOVERNMENT VES-
SELS FIRED SALUTES AS HE
CROSSED 'FRISCO BAY.

San Francisco, Oct. 6.—President Taft is on his way to Yosemite National Park today.

With the San Francisco committee, the president, with his party, left the St. Francis Hotel a few minutes past 8 o'clock. Guarded by a squad of mounted policemen, they proceeded to the transport dock, where the government tug Golden Gate was boarded.

On the trip across the bay to the Oakland mole, where the president's special train was waiting, Taft laughed and chatted with Mayor Edward R. Taylor and Frederick Stratton, collector of the port of San Francisco.

As the tug, flying the president's flag, passed the revenue cutter McCulloch, anchored midway between Goat Island and the city, Taft stood with bare head while the presidential salute—21 guns—was fired.

When Goat Island was passed, the naval apprentices on board the United States training ship Pensacola stood at attention, and the ship's guns barked out a salute in honor of the chief executive of the nation. The band played the "Star Spangled Banner" and the flag was dipped.

The train bearing Taft and the party accompanying him to the Yosemite, left the Oakland mole at 9 o'clock.

The president shook hands with Mayor Taylor and said:

"Good bye, Mr. Mayor; I want to express my gratitude, and I'll never forget the pleasant reception your city gave me."

He then grasped Chief of Police Jesse Cook by the hand, and thanked him for the manner with he was guarded by the police while in the city.

A moment after the train was under way. Until it had moved from the sheds, the president stood on the rear platform and waved a farewell to the committeemen and cheering commuters, who had gathered in large numbers to catch a last sight of him before he left this section on his "big swing around the circle."

In addition to the regular party accompanying the president, those who will be with him during his trip through the park are:

Governor Gillett, United States Senator Flint, Congressmen Needham, McKinley and Englebright, John Muir, the geologist and explorer, who led Roosevelt through the Yosemite, also accompanied Taft, and will guide the chief executive through the forests of the park.

PRESENTED EACH OTHER A WORLD OF TITLES

Cambridge, Mass., Oct. 6.—Abbott Lawrence Lowell became president of Harvard University today.

Following the inauguration of President Lowell as the head of the university, honorary degrees were conferred on a number of distinguished men and scholars, who were present, among them being Dr. Henry Morse Stephens, of the English department of the University of California. The degree of doctor of letters was conferred upon Professor Stephens.

The inauguration was conducted by

John D. Long, president of the board, before one of the greatest gatherings of eminent educators ever assembled in America. Ten thousand graduates and under-graduates of the university were present, and took part in the ceremonies.

The ceremonies included a procession around the buildings on the campus, prayer and an oration given in Latin by Lester Burton.

COURTS REBUKE A RAILROAD COMPANY

Indianapolis, Ind., Oct. 6.—The Indiana appellate court today rebuked the Vandalla railroad for appealing unimportant cases, and assessed a fine upon it for raising nonsensical, irrelevant technicalities, so as to get their cases to a higher court.

This is the first time in the history of an Indiana court that an appellant has been penalized for appealing a case.

A FLYING MACHINE TRUST NOW

The Wrights Intend Controlling
Everything That Is Too
High in the Air for
Rockefeller.

New York, Oct. 6.—The Wrights are contemplating the formation of an international flying machine trust, according to an announcement made here today, and it is said that the time is not far distant when they will be able to engage a flying machine such as they now hire a taxicab.

Charles R. Flint, formerly head of the United States rubber trust, will be the business head of the concern, according to the report, and he already has established factories in St. Petersburg, Berlin and Paris for making and marketing the Wright flying machine. Flint is expected to arrive in America October 15, when he most probably will incorporate and erect a big plant in this country.

It is said that the Wrights will hold a controlling interest in the American concern and that the Flint interests will be supreme in those abroad.

HERE IS A CASE IN POINT

California Courts Decide That
City Has the Right to
Compel Company to
Cover Ditch.

Sacramento, Cal., Oct. 6.—In an opinion filed today, the court of appeal, lays down the doctrine that a municipality has the power, under section 551 of the civil code, to compel a canal company to construct and maintain a bridge over its ditch where intersected by a street, even if the street was laid out and improved after the canal was built. The question arose in an appeal where the city of Madera was plaintiff and the Madera Canal & Irrigation Company was defendant.

DEATH LIST STEADILY GROWING

Thirty-four Known to Be Vic-
tims of the Coal Mine
Horror in British Co-
lumbia Tuesday.

MAY NUMBER FIFTY

MANY BODIES MORRIBLY MAN-
GLED, BUT MOST OF THE DEAD
SUCCEEDED TO THE TERRIBLE
AFTER-DAMP—THE SCENES OF
HORROR REVEALED

Extension, via Ladysmith, B. C., Oct. 6.—Thirty-four are now known to be dead in the terrible mine disaster here. Others are missing and little hope is held out for them. Owning to a cave-in in No. 2 stope for fifty yards it may be a week before the bodies are reached.

Sad stories are pouring in of the victims. The sister and brother-in-law of Ingraham, one of those dead in the mine, arrived last night from Kansas on a visit. Wargo and Messerich, also entombed in the black hole, returned Sunday from a hunting trip and intended to work for one day and then resume their holiday.

Rescuers resumed work at daylight, but up to 8 o'clock no other bodies in addition to the eighteen already rescued had been brought out.

Among men who lost their lives in this explosion there were none more popular or better known, not only on Vancouver Island, but also in sporting circles on the mainland, than Tom O'Connell, the star fullback of the Ladysmith football team. From the position in which his body was found it was evident that he had taken alarm at the first sound of the explosion and made a desperate effort to escape. He was working some distance from the spot where the explosion originated and one of the few men who escaped said O'Connell had called to him and then started to run to escape the deadly after-damp which generally causes a greater loss of life than the explosion itself. He was found with his arms drawn up and his leg muscles still tense from the last desperate rush, more determined than any he had ever made on a football field, in which he was trying to reach fresh air. In his mad rush he had dashed full tilt against a pillar in the darkness. The shock evidently stunned him and allowed the deadly gas to overtake him. His body was among the five found when the rescuers managed to penetrate past the two-mile mark on No. 2 stope. Alex Milos, a giant Greek with the frame and muscles of a Hercules, was the last of the original quintet of bodies rescued. He had been terribly mangled and burned by the explosion, but his phenomenal physique enabled him to press on until exhausted nature finally gave way and the after-damp overtook him. With the exception of one body, the head and toes of which were so badly mangled as to be still unidentified at a late hour last night, Milos' body was the most shockingly mangled of the lot.

Stripped to the waist as he was at his work, the flame of the explosion literally peeled the skin off until it was hanging in shreds over his hands like the fragments of a badly torn blackened glove. The sole of one of his heavy shoes was torn clean off and the uppers of both hung in tatters with not the slightest sign of a lace in one shoe. The big fellow was well known around the mines, owing to his feats of strength, and strong men gathered around the tunnel mouth shed tears when his body was brought out.
