WANTED HIM BACK IN OHIO

The officer called at the house just before 6 o'clock and knocked at the front door, but, upon hearing a door slam in the rear of the building, and supposing suspicion had been aroused, he entered by the back door and saw Zimmerman in the act of getting up from the family supper table and putting on his coat. Deputy Esch then informed Zimmerman that he was under arrest. An officer will start immediately from the East to take charge of Zimmerman.

ROSEBURG CARRIED BY THE WETS

Local Optionists Are Defeated After a Square Fight in a Dry Town—Change of Sentiment.

[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE.] Roseburg, Oct. 6.—The city election in Roseburg Monday was the most hotly contested ever held in the city. One ticket, nominated in a church, made the enforcement of the local option law the chief issue, while the opposite ticket, the successful one, made city improvements an issue. The largest vote in the history of the city was polled, 779.

The ticket elected follows: Mayor, Dr. F. W. Haynes; recorder, A. N.

Orentt (re-elected); councilmen, H. T. McClallen, J. F. Clements, S. K. Sykes, Joseph Micelli, Sam Josephson, A. A. Jones and O. C. Baker. Five councilmen held over from last term.

Contesting for the office of mayor were Dr. Haynes, leading the "City Improvement" ticket, and B. W. Strong, leading the "Citizens' Ticket," nominated a week ago in the Methodist church. The Strong ticket made its campaign on a platform asserting that the present administration has been lax in the enforcement of the prohibition law. The defeat of the church ticket in a dry town in a dry county was a surprise.
