A VERY BAD WRECK ON NORTH BANK

Engineer Bigsby Killed and Seven Passengers Seriously Injured in Last Night's Wreck.

[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE.] Portland, Or., Oct. 26.—Engineer Bigsby killed, his fireman and a mail clerk fatally injured, and seven passengers suffering serious injuries, is the total result today of a wreck of train No. 4 of the Spokane, Portland & Seattle railroad, leaving here at 5:40 last night. The accident occurred between Fountain and Roosevelt, flag stations east of Vancouver, Wash., at midnight.

The wreck was caused by a landslide across the tracks. Bigsby's engine and a mail car was derailed. When the crash came the engine heeled over and Bigsby was caught beneath the boiler and roasted to death. His fireman jumped, as did the mail clerk, and both were pinned under the wreckage made by the mail and express cars, when they piled over the engine.

As soon as news of the wreck reached Vancouver, a rescue and wrecking train was sent out, and the dead and injured are being brought there.

Bigsby lived at Vancouver, and leaves a widow.

GAVE UP SEARCH FOR MURDERER

[United Press Leased Wire.] San Bernardino, Cal., Oct. 26.—After participating for five days in the man hunt for "Billy Boy," the Plute Indian murderer of old Mike Boniface and his daughter, Mary Nita, Deputy Sheriff Preciado started today with a fresh posse for the mountain section north of the city, known as the Cox ranch district. Preciado and his jaded officers reached San Bernardino at dark yesterday from The Pipes, a desert station. The search for the murderer resulted in nothing but the discovery of another clue, which the deputy sheriff hopes will result in the capture of the fugitive. At The Pipes Preciado was reached by a messenger from Cox's ranch, who stated that the Indian had been seen in the foothills in that vicinity. Preciado immediately returned to this city and

re-organized his party. Information from the desert today stated that Sheriff Ralphs and his posse have at last found Billy's trail, and have hopes of making his capture.

Storekeepers at Victorville and other outlying villages have been warned by the officers to sell no 30-30 ammunition to Indians. This step was taken to guard against the fugitive receiving aid through the desert tribes.

RETURNED TRUE BILL YESTERDAY

True bills were handed down late yesterday afternoon by the grand jury against Emma Thomas, Julia Downie, Rose Leland, Hattie McGinnis and Dollie Richie. These women are charged with conducting a bawdy house in the city of Salem. This morning all five of the defendants were arraigned before Judge Burnett in the circuit court, and after District Attorney McNary read the indictment, Attorney Wm. Kaiser, representing the defendants, asked until 10 o'clock tomorrow morning in which to plead, which was granted by the court.

Just what the outcome of these cases will be is difficult to foretell, but it is the opinion of many that some interesting points of law will be introduced by the attorneys before the cases are decided, unless the defendants conclude to plead guilty. The same persons were haled before the municipal courts of Salem, but due to defective local laws, they were discharged.

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they were to be applied to. (Laughter.)

"Of course, such propositions send a chill down the back of a member of the appropriations committee (like my friend Senator Perkins) and down the back of everybody connected with the expenditure of money in congress—goose flesh, when you even mention it. (Laughter.)

"Therefore, I warn those who are seriously earnest in this matter that they must be reasonable and wise as serpents in making their suggestions in respect to the matter so as not to frighten those who feel charged with saving us from financial disaster." (Laughter.)

"So I think this trip has been full of information for me," he said.

"It has made me much more alive to the immense importance of conservation of our natural resources, and especially with the importance of dealing prudently with our arid lands. The federal government has, of course, resources greater than most corporations. Now for the federal government ought to go in this matter may be a subject for discussion."

He outlined his plans for this work and his proposition for protecting the water power sites of the government, by imposing conditions, to be readjusted from time to time, so that the person or corporation obtaining the sites will share the profit with the government. He said:

"I am not a paternalist, and yet I am not a doctrinaire of the 'Laissez Faire' school. I think that a judicious mixture of paternalism where it trains the children of the government in the way in which they should go is proper.

"If we limit our expenditures on this head as they are limited in the reclamation act to the proceeds of the sales of public lands and to the proceeds of bonds to be paid out of sales of public lands as is now proposed, I don't think we shall have carried the matter to such an excess as will demoralize our people."
