

WOULD FILL JAILS TO OVERFLOWING

[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE.]
Missoula, Mont., Oct. 6.—Trouble is feared here as the result of the campaign undertaken by Miss Elizabeth Gurley Flynn, an organizer of the Industrial Workers of the World, to free 35 members of the order who were arrested while conducting a demonstration in the streets of the city. Last evening Miss Flynn, who herself was recently liberated from the county jail, after a similar demonstration, led a mob of more than 2000 persons into the jail yard. A show of strength by the authorities prevented any actual forceful demonstration, but rabid speeches were made by members of the mob from the steps of the prison.

The city is practically in a state of siege. Meetings are held on the street nightly by the agitators, who are arrested and imprisoned, only to be succeeded by volunteers brought from San Francisco and other coast cities by the leaders of the I. W. W. movement. Miss Flynn declared today that she would continue importing street corner orators until the jail was so overcrowded that the authorities would be compelled to release prisoners.

HEBREW SCHOLAR PASSES AWAY

New York, Oct. 6.—Falk Vadaver, considered one of the world's foremost Hebrew scholars, is dead here at his home. He was 35 years old. Vadaver was prominently known for his commentaries on the Bible and his poems.

Up until three years ago, when he retired, he was rabbi of the largest temple here, and for many years he led the largest Jewish congregation west of the Rocky mountains, while stationed at San Francisco.

Vadaver is survived by a widow, two sons and five daughters, one of whom is Mrs. Washington Dodge, wife of the San Francisco assessor.

HIGHWAYMEN ROBBED THE AUTO RIDERS

Chicago, Oct. 6.—Threatening to shoot if they were disobeyed, two masked bandits last night held up and robbed two men and two women who were driving an automobile at Forty-Fourth street and Western avenue. The two robbers forced the victims to take them in the machine, after holding them up, and drive them across the prairie, where they disappeared.

The victims of the holdup gave their names as William Watkins and George White.

Watkins lost \$10 and his gold watch, and White gave up \$20. Jewelry was taken from the women.
