

HIS STOMACH PAID FOR HEART'S FOOLISHNESS

Seattle, Wash., Oct. 7.—Milo Crocker, aged 22, a well-known actor, is in the city hospital today with a bullet wound in his stomach, this is believed to be fatal. He was shot late last night by Patrolman Charles B. Melson, following a quarrel over a girl.

Crocker and the girl, Ethel Livingston, had attended a dance at Dreamland hall. Crocker, according to the girl, told her that if she went home with anyone else but him he would cause trouble. She paid no heed to his threats. Shortly afterwards Melson was notified that Crocker was looking for the man who accompanied the girl to her home. The policeman met the jealous man on Sixth avenue, and ordered him to drop the big hunting knife he was carrying in his hand. Crocker refused, and made a lunge at the officer. Melson then fired.

Crocker is a son of M. D. Crocker, of the American Paint and Wall Paper Company of this city.

DEEP SEA COMPANIES HAVE FALLING OUT

San Francisco, Oct. 7.—A rate war, which promises to effect the coffee trade of the South American continent is imminent, for the reason that the Pacific Mail Steamship line, the Kosmos line and the Jacobson-Ostrander Steamship Company have individually started a fight for the coffee trade of the south.

Trouble began several days ago, when the Kosmos people withdrew from the "coffee pool," and it was unofficially announced that the company would "go it alone."

Today it is reported that the company will make a cut under the present coffee transportation rates, and will carry the cereal direct to Europe via the Straits of Magellan, instead of shipping over the Isthmus of Tehuantepec, as has heretofore been done.

With the Kosmos line outside the pale of a traffic agreement it is expected that the other lines will be compelled to follow, and a general slashing of rates to secure their share of the traffic will result.

HOLDS FILIPINOS ARE MONGOLIANS

Oakland, Cal., Oct. 7.—According to a decision of Chief Deputy County Clerk A. E. Johnson, Filipinos are Mongolians, and for this reason cannot be married under the statutes of the state of California, which does not allow the issuance of marriage licenses to Mongolians, negroes or mulattoes with white persons.

The case in point occurred yesterday, when the deputy refused to issue a license to Eugene Tabanas, a native of Manila, and Mary Lebric, a French woman.

Johnson was upheld in his interpretation of the law by Assistant District Attorney W. L. Hines and Chief Deputy Philip Carey.

COOK PREPARES TO SUBMIT RECORDS

St. Louis, Mo., Oct. 7.—Duplicate copies of his records made in the dash to the north pole are being prepared today by Dr. Frederick A. Cook, and will be sent simultaneously to the American Geographical Society and the University of Copenhagen, in Denmark.

Dr. Cook, in an interview, outlined his plan as follows:

"My original records will go to the University of Copenhagen. I intend, however, to have duplicates made. These will be submitted to the American Geographical Society. I shall request the Copenhagen authorities to withhold their announcement until the American society shall have had time to report, and then the findings shall be made simultaneously on both sides of the Atlantic."
