TRIBESMEN MASSACRE SPANIARDS

Trap Party in a Ravine Shoot
Down Hundreds and Wind
Up by Murdering the
Poor Captives.

Lisbon, Portugal, Oct. 8.—The Spaniards in the Melilla peninsula lost heavily today in a reconnoitre of the position of the Moors about the fortifications, according to dispatches received here from Melilla.

A large force of infantry and cavalry was trapped by the tribesmen in a shallow ravine. With ranks ensiled, the Spaniards were exposed to a withering fire from the Moorish rifles, while they could make no adequate return, owing to the concealment of their enemies behind rocks and underbrush.

The Rifflata had mounted heavy rifles along the tops of the hills surrounding the ravine. The gunners had the range before the Spaniards appeared, and a destructive shell fire caused great slaughter.

The Spaniards throw forward the cavalry to cover the retreat of the infantry. When this was done, the Moors charged the retreating cavalry, and scores of the Don's were killed and 70 horsemen captured.

It is reported that the tribesmen then massacred their captives. All cannon and supplies carried by the advance expedition fell into the hands of the Moors.

ONLY A DOG, BUT
THEN A GOOD DOG

For the first time in the history of the county court, a dog was permitted to appear in court, and to be heard in his own case, which the strange pe-

mitted by that august body to pleaditioner did with pathetic, human-like intelligence.

While the county court was in session this morning, the door opened and a large, beautiful black Irish bird dog entered the court room with a most winning smile, and, going up to the court, arose on his hind legs, putting his fore feet on a table, and, with mouth spread in a large grin, he took a good, deliberate look at each of the honorable gentlemen sitting behind the bench, while the court machine stopped off short and remained attentive listeners until the owner of the brute questioner appeared, and made inquiry as to the county rules regarding taxes on dogs.

Mr. William Wilson, formerly of Wichita, Kansas, is the owner of the dog, and, while in the presence of the court, he told a romantic but sad story in connection with himself and his most valuable property, the dog. Mr. Wilson said while he was farming in Kansas several years ago, he was accustomed to drive his horses over a certain bridge near his place, but one day, while one of those destructive wind and rain storms was brewing, he had just drove upon one approach of the bridge, when he discovered the other approach was gone. He took his ax and repaired the structure sufficiently to permit him to cross, and had just climbed into the wagon when the storm broke directly over him, and in some manner he was knocked from his wagon into the river, and for two days he knew nothing whatever. In the meantime, while he was in the water, his dog, the same animal present in court, had run down the banks of the stream, and when he saw his master floating downwards, the faithful animal swam out to him, catching his clothing in his teeth, and brought him unconscious to shore, and then dragged him out of danger to a hedge fence close by where Mr. Wilson came out of the stupor.

While relating this story later to a Journal reporter, the poor man shed tears, so great was his love for the big brown-eyed dog who saved his life beyond a doubt. Mr. Wilson has property in Washington, but he is intending to locate in Salem. He is a gardner and farmer, and praises the country around this city flatteringly.

The county court gave Mr. Wilson the assurance that no county taxes would be imposed, with the exception of the regular assessment taxes and the Carnegie medal winner will not be subject to the taxes then until he has been a resident of Marion county six months.

late civil war to preserve the Union. That 5000 officers, reared and educated in German military schools, enlisted in the army of the North, and made it possible to drill the crude volunteers into a compact body which later on made the splendid showing of which all became so proud. He spoke of General Franz Sigel, and other high military officers of German descent. He showed that Missouri, Maryland and Kentucky were saved to the Union at the beginning of the war through the staunch patriotism of the Germans. "Very few people are aware," said Dr. Smith, "that it was a German who printed the first bible ever published in America. Even less know," he continued, "that the Declaration of Independence was first printed in this country by a German paper, the Philadelphia 'Tage Blatt.'"

He showed that in the arts, the

sciences, manufacturing, medicine, and, in fact, all of the pursuits and professions of life in this country, the German-American could be found always at the very top.

"Even Oregon," he said, "owed more to a man of German birth than to any other person. Henry Villard, who came to the United States as a boy of eighteen years, was instrumental in the building of the O. R. & N. and the Oregon Short Line, and because of this was responsible for the first transcontinental railroad to Portland. Next, after many struggles and trials, this same German by birth brought to a crowning finish the Northern Pacific also to Portland."

In winding up his address he referred to that characteristic of the German-American citizenship, which always stands for sobriety, upright citizenship, and all those things which are essential in building up a permanent and liberty-loving country. He stated: "You will find the

German-American leading in every path of life, but there is one place where you seldom if ever find him, and that is in our penitentiaries."

After some splendid singing given by the Arion Singing society, of Portland, Col. E. Hofer, of Salem, delivered one of his characteristic German-American addresses, which, judging by the hearty applause it received, undoubtedly greatly pleased the audience. Col. Hofer does not claim to be an expert in the German tongue, and, as he stated when he wound up his address, he simply spoke. "Wie ihm der Schnabel gewachsen ist."

The gathering ended about 10:30, the audience all joining in singing the "Star Spangled Banner."
