PORTOLA FESTIVAL IS NEXT

A triumphal entry into San Francisco will be made by Don Gaspar de Portola on October 19, when the stalwart old Spanish warrior will return to that city after an absence of 140 years. The booming of guns from all the foreign battleships in port for the purpose, will announce his entrance and at the same time give greetings to California's first governor.

Then will Don Gaspar proceed from the Ferry through the thronged city thoroughfares, riding boldly and picturesquely at the head of thousands of the best drilled and most perfectly trained company of dragoons recruited from the handsomest and sturdiest men in San Francisco will serve as the escort of the royal Don. Mounted upon spirited chargers, adorned with helmets and cuirasses, this bodyguard will furnish one of the most picturesque and characteristic bits of life and color in the entire pageant.

Following the Spanish Dragoons will march a vast procession of infantry, artillery, cavalry, sailors from the various war vessels and uniformed teams from fraternal orders which will extend through the streets for miles.

Squads of Chinese and Japanese fighting men from their battleships, detachments from the Dutch and Italian cruisers, and jacksies from the English and German warships in the harbor will march along, side by side, and our own soldiers and sailors will follow the dragoons, marching to the inspiring strains of huge regimental and naval bands.

Passing up the streets, whose tall stately buildings are to be a marvel of color, and viewed by thousands and thousands of excited eyes, the king and his command will proceed to Marshall Square, where the mayor will meet the noble Spaniard and after a formal greeting will present him with the golden key to the city gates. The key in his possession, the king will then go to meet his beautiful queen. This event will be one of the most striking and impressive of the day. Behold the doughty warrior, clad in his leather buskin and top boots, with clanking sword and waving plumes, riding forth to meet his fair consort, Queen Virginia, also mounted on a fiery steed of purest white and wearing the velvet riding habit of the eighteenth century Spanish court.

Behind them and closely attentive to their every movement will be the sixty dashing dragoons, giving a piquant flash of color to the already brilliant scene. Their gorgeous uniforms will be patterned after those of the original Spanish soldiers of Don Gaspar de Portola. Coats of red and yellow, with large puffed sleeves; red trousers with yellow stripes and set

off by high yellow leggings, will be the distinctive features of their dress. Helmets and cuirasses will be worn and the old-time ruche, worn about the throat, will complete this unique and artistic uniform.

After leaving the square, the royal couple will ride on to the St. Francis for luncheon, after which they will again mount their fiery steeds and proceed towards the bay, where, in their honor, the great international fleet will pass in review, dipping their colors and saluting with their big guns as they pass before the royal pair.

That evening there will be an elaborate reception at the St. Francis, when the king and queen will receive all the notables—the Spanish minister, foreign envoys and naval officers from the foreign battleships.

Spanish War Veterans—

The Spanish War Veterans are beginning to take an active interest in this city again toward thoroughly organizing a camp, and the future developments of this well planned attempt to bring the veterans of the Spanish war more closely together will be looked upon by both the other camps and the public in general who have, since the Salem veterans have taken action, given them great credit, and an interest is being manifested by all who done active service in the army, and those who followed the heroic work of the boys in blue from Oregon while in the bitter fight with the Spaniards. A meeting was called Wednesday, and a large crowd of Salem veterans attended. Junior Vice-President J. I. McLaughlin, of the Spanish War Veterans, was in attendance, and delivered an interesting and instructive address to the members of Camp Hibard. Commander McLaughlin is the sole representative in the field in the capacity of commander west of Chicago. He makes his home in Los Angeles, and has championed the success of some of the largest camps in the United States. Next Saturday evening the regular camp meeting will be held at the city hall, at which five new recruits will be mustered in line, along with the 30 odd now enlisted. This will make a company of 35 veterans of the Spanish war for Camp Hibard, and prospects ahead are favorable for a much larger camp.
