MEYERS NOW IN JAIL

sued him to give himself up. Rev. Larden recognized George immediately, and, knowing of the shooting, at once explained the useless hardship he was adopting in running away. After he had talked with the tired lad for some time, and pointing out many substantial reasons why he should give himself up peacefully, George consented. When Larden first met the boy in the road, Meyers said he was hungry and wanted some money and a bicycle to get to Portland with, where he thought his father would provide means with which he could reach the northern country, and thus escape, but, after he had been given a steaming supper, and had time to reflect upon what Larden had told him, he completely resigned and told Larden that he would help him up, which they both did and drove to Salem.

When Meyers reached the sheriff's office and was met by the authorities, he apparently seemed greatly relieved. He told the story of his entire flight in a straightforward and honest manner. He told of his hardships while the officers were after him; how he would jump over fences when the sound of automobile or buggy came to him, and his feelings at these times were those of a person frightened to submission but afraid to give himself up. He said that when he traveled toward Pratum a strong desire came to him to surrender, and he let it take possession of him until he was in as far as Winter street, but there his nerve failed him, and he went to the country again, with mind undecided and in a state of painful despair.

Up to the present time, George refuses to see any one with the exception of his brothers and Attorney L. H. McMahon. Many of his friends have sent their sympathy and regret to him in his trouble, but the lad remains in a quiet and thoughtful humor. He has changed from a jolly, good-natured boy, to a serious and depressed young man, but for all that he relishes his meals and the hours of rest more than he has since the crime, and appears greatly relieved.

George was on the point of submitting when he left Winter street for the country again, as attested by his disposing of his 38-calibre automatic gun and his ammunition in Pudding river. For two days prior to the time he was around Jefferson, Meyers says his actions are now absolutely unknown to him. He does not recall what he did during these two days.

Tomorrow morning George Meyers will be arraigned before Judge Burnett on the charge of murder in the first degree, but it is not probable that his trial will be heard this term of court, as attorneys for the defense will require many days in which to collect testimony. The state, however, can be put up to the jury in an hour's time.

Rev. Larden has not called on the governor as yet for the \$1000 re-

ding river bridge he went upon to the country road and traveled about a mile northeast to where a gate was located on the north side of the road. This gate was one mile and a half from Pratum, and the road running through the timber from the gate runs directly north. The Larden home is about a mile from the gate entrance and is situated among a thick growth of timber.

Mrs. Larden and her two sons were at home when the Journal reporter called, but her story was brief. She said:

"Meyers was present only at supper time, and I was busy preparing supper and did not pay much attention to him, although I knew he was the much-sought fugitive." She said "Meyers talked very little while at the house, and that he ate an exceptionally hearty meal. He appeared to be laboring under considerable excitement for the first few moments, but presently, after he had completed his meal, Meyers appeared relieved and his features showed less strain than when he first arrived."

Mrs. Larden, when questioned regarding Meyers' actions and general appearance when he arrived at the Larden home, showed much sympathy for the unfortunate young man, and no doubt her kind motherly face and a generous hospitality was a strong inducement in allaying the fears of the exhausted and discouraged fugitive. Although Mrs. Larden was not an intimate acquaintance of Meyers, she recognized him to be the man who had stayed the police officer, Tom Eckhart, and, being familiar with the circumstances, to a certain extent, leading up to the actual appearance of the boy himself, the kind lady evidently viewed the occurrence as being unfortunate throughout.

Meyers was in a pitiable state when he first showed up at the Larden house. His eyes were sunken and red, and his features drawn, and his general appearance was that of a man nearing the end of flight with willingness after a long and soul-harrowing flight.

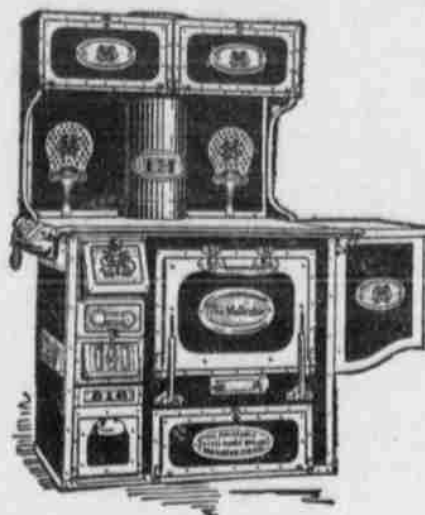
The Man Who Caught Him.

Rev. Louis P. Larden is a well-known Free Methodist exhorter in this city, and was at the W. C. T. U. Sunday afternoon meeting next door to The Capital Journal office yesterday, his usual Sunday place of service. He frankly admits having used the higher power of persuasion and prayer to God to save young Meyers' soul, and give himself up peacefully. He says he had no thought of the reward, and does not care whether he gets it or not. He says he will take the state reward, if it is due him, and also the \$50 offered by Mayor Rodgers on behalf of the city. He says he will not take the \$25 offered by Chief Gibson nor the \$25 offered by Sheriff Minto, as he regards that as money they would pay out of their own pockets, and not fairly due him. As the matter stands he will probably get the \$1050. He says he is a laboring man and does not need any reward to live, but if he gets it he will make good use of it. His success with Meyers he attributes entirely to the power of prayer, and the influence of God in human affairs.
