EXPLODED MINES IN THE COLUMBIA

First Time in History of Coast
Submarine Mines Have
Been Exploded to
Test Them.

[UNITED PRESS LEARNED WIRE.]
Fort Stevens, Or., Oct. 12.—The first submarine practice ever held in Oregon waters began here today when gunners of the Thirty-Fourth company of coast artillery exploded hundreds of pounds of dynamite from the bed of the Columbia river. The practice was witnessed by the department commander and distinguished visitors.

The mines were laid at the mouth of the Columbia river.

In each mine was enough gunpowder to wreck the largest battleship afloat. The mines were connected with electric apparatus ashore. As soon as an imaginary enemy reached the place where the mine lay, the signal was given to discharge the mine, the current raced over the wires and a column of water shot 100 feet in the air.

Mortar practice will begin tomorrow, and work with the big rifles of the fort will follow.

COURT GIVES HARD BLOW TO "PROHIS"

Decides that Cities Under Cer-
tain Charters May Control
Sale of Liquor Re-
gardless of Law.

Holding that under the charter of 1907, adopted by the City of St. Johns, supersedes the local option law enacted by the legislature in 1904, the regulations of saloons and liquor traffic within the city limits of St. Johns, or any other municipal corporation, is exempt from the operation of the local option law, Sam Cochran was ordered exonerated and the city given the privilege of regulating its own saloons and liquor traffic.

The defendant and appellant in this case was informed against, tried and convicted for violating the local option law in precinct No. 91 in St. Johns. The case was tried before Judge R. G. Morrow of Multnomah county and a decree was entered in favor of the plaintiffs.

The city council, acting upon the advice of the city attorney to the effect that the local option law did not apply to that locality, adopted an ordinance permitting the sale of liquor and the carrying on of liquor traffic upon the payment of a license fee

of \$1,200 per annum, and after the defendant and appellant in this suit had purchased a permit and paid over the necessary fee he was arrested for violating the local option law, but the supreme court holds that in as much as the act of the legislature of 1904 gives authority to enforce acts violating the local option law the city enacted an ordinance whereby persons were permitted to deal in liquor traffic by the city council and that the city has the right to govern its own regulation of saloons and the sale of liquor.

Other cases handed down by the supreme court were: M. A. Zellig, respondent, against the Blue Point Oyster company, appellant, appealed from the circuit court of Multnomah county, Robert G. Morrow, Judge. Motion to dismiss the proceedings granted in an opinion written by Justice Slater.

State, plaintiff, vs. C. H. Attwood and C. H. T. Attwood, respondents, appealed from the circuit court of Multnomah county, J. B. Cleland, Judge. Lower court's judgment affirmed in an opinion written by Justice McBride. This is an abortion case in which the defendants were informed against, tried and convicted of demoralizing the public peace and dignity by misconduct in surgical operation, an operation having been performed, as alleged, on a person under age.
