PEARY'S CHARGES ARE STALE

Relies on Statement He Claims Was Made to Him by Eskimos—All the Evidence Hearsay.

HE HAS NO BACKING

ASKS PUBLIC TO BELIEVE THAT ESKIMOS TOLD HIM CERTAIN THINGS AGAINST COOK, BUT HAS NOT A WORD OF ACTUAL PROOF BACK OF STATEMENT.

Cleveland, O., Oct. 13.—Dr. Frederick A. Cook, the Brooklyn explorer, today made a hot retort to Commander Robert E. Peary's published charges to the effect that Dr. Cook did not reach the north pole.
Commander Peary's charges form a statement to the public, which was signed by himself and four other members of his party, and declare that Dr. Cook's Eskimo boys, I-Took-a-Shoo and Avelah, admitted to them that the Brooklyn explorer did not reach the pole, and that his farthest point north was Cape Thomas Hubbard in latitude 81½ degrees.
Dr. Cook declared today that the Eskimos had been instructed not to tell Commander Peary of his trip over the polar seas, and that they had kept their word.

Regarding Commander Peary's map, prepared from the statements of the Eskimos, Dr. Cook said:
"Harry Whitney, the big game hunter, has said that at his talk the Eskimos did not understand the questions asked them by Commander Peary. Neither did they understand the map, and their replies have been twisted to such a perverted interest."
Dr. Cook declared that he would not enter into any argument, but would bring the Eskimos to New York at his own expense. In this connection he said:
"They will prove, as did Whitney, all that I have said."
The Brooklyn explorer added that the complete records of his trip were in the hands of the University of Copenhagen, and that as soon as they were passed upon they would be placed in the hands of the entire scientific world for a decision.
He also declared that he would bring his cached instruments to civilization next June, when the ice would allow his sending for them, and that these would be submitted as further proof of his claims.

SENOR ESTRADA IS ELECTED GOVERNOR

Colon, Oct. 13.—Revolutionists have overthrown President Jose Santos Zelaya, of Nicaragua, and John Estrada, governor of the department of Zelaya, has been proclaimed provisional president.
The capture of the government was made without a shot being fired, and no further trouble is looked for, as it is known that the interior of the country will support the newly formed government.
Zelaya is at Cape Gracias, and it is reported that he will not make an attempt to interfere with the new regime.
Americans in the country are delighted over the overthrow of the Zelayan government, as in many ways his tactics were obstructive to the developments of the nations resources.

PITTSBURG WINS FIFTH OF SERIES

Plays Double Out and Comes In a Winner of Fifth Game by the Score of Eight to Four.

CHANCES ARE 2 TO 1

MUST WIN ONE OUT OF THREE TO CARRY OFF BANNER—BRILLIANT PLAYING AND TREMENDOUS CROWDS WERE FEATURE OF THE BIG MEET TODAY.

Pittsburg, Oct. 13.—A biting wind greeted the Detroit Tigers and the Pittsburg Pirates, the contending teams for the world's baseball championship, upon their arrival here today for the fifth game of the series.
The cold wind made Forbes field dry and fast, and a great contest is expected when the umpire calls the teams to action this afternoon.
"Babe" Adams is scheduled to do the heaving for the Pirates while Manager Jennings will depend on "Wild Bill" Donovan to repeat his victory of last Saturday, when he had the heavy hitting buccaneers completely at his mercy.
When the Detroit Tigers and the Pittsburg Pirates lined up for the fifth game of the world's championship series this afternoon 22,000 persons were crowded into Forbes field. The batting order follows:

BALLINGER WILL KNOCK SENTIMENT

San Francisco, Oct. 13.—The city administration has practically decided upon a bond issue of \$40,000,000 for the full development of the Lake Eleanor-Hetch Hetchy water system. This step was determined after an extended conference of city officials yesterday, in the office of Mayor Taylor.
The action follows the conference of Mayor Taylor with Secretary Ballinger, when, it is said, the secretary assured the mayor that as long as the city of San Francisco adhered to the terms of the Garfield grant, and devoted its attention to the Lake Eleanor feature of the project, it had absolutely nothing to fear from him. Mayor Taylor interpreted this alleged declaration of Secretary Ballinger as an invitation to go ahead with the work.
As the voters have already declared for the Hetch Hetchy and Lake Eleanor propositions, it remains for them to authorize the bonds.
The only other phase of the proposition now pending is the clause of the Garfield amendment, under which the question must be laid before the voters.
Ballinger Follows Muir.
Yosemite, Cal., Oct. 13.—Secretary of the Interior Ballinger started today for the Hetch Hetchy and Lake Eleanor districts, for the purpose of viewing the proposed reservoir sites for a San Francisco municipal water supply system.
Included in the party which accompanied him was George Otis Smith, director of the United States geological survey, who will familiarize the secretary with the geological formation in the vicinity of the projected dams.
Major Forsythe, superintendent of the park, personally has charge of the party, and will guide them on their tour of inspection.
