PRESIDENT S

(Continued from Page 1.)

On this one day, at least, ancient radical feuds are forgotten; the bitter controversy over the strip of land along the Rio Grande known as El Chamizal Zone, is put aside for the time being, and "gringo" and "greaser" are drinking each other's health in mesquite and pulque, whiskey and beer.

All the business houses of the two border towns are closed for the holiday celebration, which begins early in the morning, when the president reaches Juarez in his magnificent car, and will not close until Mr. Taft returns this evening from the banquet given in his honor by President Diaz, and is escorted to the railway station for the resumption of his trans-continental journey.

President Diaz looked more like an emperor than the people's choice of a republic, surrounded by a blaze of officers in gold lace, himself wearing a uniform gorgeous with the precious metal and glittering orders, was met at the American approach to the international bridge by Secretary of War Dickinson, Brigadier-General Meyer and Governor Campbell, of Texas; General Meyer, commanding the department of Texas, had with him from Fort Sam Houston batteries A, B and C, of the Third field artillery, two squadrons of the Third cavalry and the entire Ninth infantry. Artillery and cavalry soldiers were drawn up around the spot where General Diaz alighted from his carriage to receive the formal greetings of Secretary Dickinson, acting as the personal representative of President Taft.

After being welcomed to the country by Secretary Dickinson was welcomed in the name of the state of Texas by Governor Campbell, and to the city of El Paso by the mayor. The cavalry band struck up "La Paloma," the soldiers forming themselves into an escort of honor, and while the artillery cannon boomed out 21 guns for the distinguished guest, the Mexican executive was given a smart pace to the house where President Taft was awaiting him, the following order being maintained:

Brigadier-General Meyer and staff
 One squadron of cavalry.
 President Diaz's carriage.
 Carriages and personal escort of President Diaz.
 One squadron of cavalry.
 The field artillery.

The infantry was drawn up about the house where the meeting of the presidents took place and when President Diaz arrived came the salute. Captain Archibald W. Butt, military aide to President Taft, emerged from the house and escorted President Diaz into the presence of the president of the United States.

Standing directly behind President Taft, as the introductions were made were Postmaster-General Hitchcock, Secretary Nagle, of the department of commerce and labor, and Secretary of War Dickinson.

President Taft grasped President Diaz' hand warmly, told him how glad he was to welcome him in the name of the people of the United

States, and expressed the hope that the cordial relations that have existed for so many years between the two great republics of the Western Hemisphere will continue for ages to come.

President Diaz, who speaks English with fluency and accuracy, replied in similar happy, diplomatic vein.

After all the members of the Mexican president's staff had been formally presented and the speeches, previously exchanged between the foreign officers of the two powers, and O. K. by each, had been delivered, the two presidents had a friendly chat over a light luncheon of sandwiches and champagne.

If Presidents Taft and Diaz took up any of the international troubles in their little talk, the stenographers present did not record the conversation. If the Mexican executive consulted with the American over the threatened rumbling of a revolution that appears among his own people, and which is said to be only waiting for his promised resignation as a signal to burst forth, it was not given to the press.

The first interview lasted only a few minutes. President Diaz then made his formal adieu, and was escorted back to the international bridge in the same manner in which he had come.

Half an hour later, or shortly before noon, President Taft emerged from his temporary residence, crossed the international bridge, and was received in his turn by President Diaz.

As the Mexican chief left his soldiery on his side of the river when he came a visiting the United States, so President Taft dropped his military escort at the bridge approach, and rode over the Rio Grande accompanied only by his military aide, Captain Butt. The ceremonies in Juarez were practically identical with those in El Paso, instead of receiving the official respects of General Diaz he paid his own.

The banquet to be given here by President Diaz in Juarez tonight is to be the most costly ever given in the north of Mexico. The priceless Maximilian china set, which is one of the most famous possessions of the Mexican government, will be used, and the most expert chefs in the republic will prepare the viands.

After his earlier meeting with President Diaz, President Taft will be the guest of honor at a luncheon given by the chamber of commerce of El Paso.

Mr. Taft's train is due to leave El Paso for the East at 8 p. m.
