failures the news-extractors passed him up. Not good at political gossip or story telling, a confirmed bachelor, and avoiding society affairs, never taking a drink or a smoke, he was in no sense a mixer, or free mingler with men and women who do things at the national capitol. On top of this he was hounded and hammered by the newspapers at Portland, did not win the favor of President Roosevelt, was not given to hot-air methods of blowing his own horn, or the modern genteel arts of exaggeration, and he returned to his law practice at Portland disgusted with his experiences at holding high office. His friends say he would not accept the governorship of Oregon or the next senatorship if offered to him, but he is ambitious to live down his past reputation of being a political boss and demonstrate that he is able to rule well in a city of the second class. Progressive office holding has no allurements for Mayor Simon. He has tasted the sweets of victory and felt the thrill of being entrusted with power. He has also drank from the cup of defeats and drained the bitter dregs of disappointed hopes. He is the antithesis of Balzac's heroine “who still wandered on the daisied brink of life where illusions seemed real,” and has a little of “that divine sense of humor that rainbows the tears of the world.” E. SIXTEEN-YEAR-OLD BOY SENT TO THE PEN

Oakland, Cal., Oct. 18.—William Clancey, a 16-year-old boy, was taken to San Quentin penitentiary today to begin a two-year term for burglary committed at Red Bluff, Cal. The lad was brought to this city yesterday en route for the prison and lodged in the county jail. He appeared so youthful that the police hesitated to receive him, as they were of the opinion that he should be placed in the juvenile detention home.

Clancey was finally placed in a cell from which he was removed today and taken to the prison by Deputy Sheriff E. B. Mormouth, of Tehama county. According to Mormouth, the credit of convicting the youth of burglary goes to District Attorney W. A. Fish, of Tehama county. Before the judge would sentence Clancey, he required the district attorney to make an affidavit that the boy was 15 years old. According to Mormouth, the boy is a runaway boy from Chicago. He was put off the train at Red Bluff. Shortly after his arrival he was caught purloining goods from the home of a Mrs. Doan.

SHIPOWNERS WILL RAID CONGRESS

Seattle, Wash., Oct. 18.—Plans are today being discussed by local shipping men to organize shippers on the Pacific, Gulf and Atlantic coasts, and the inland river navigation companies, to uphold the ship subsidy measure, and use their influence with congressional representatives to bring about the betterment of American shipping. Local marine men declare the shippers of the country must take organized action if they hope to gain success for the movement. At the last session of congress a subsidy bill was defeated by a small majority, and it is believed that if an organization composed of every shipping firm in the country renews the fight there is a chance of such a bill passing the next congress.

QUEBEC FIRE COST A MILLION DOLARS
