## The Dead Hand of Prof. Francisco Ferrer Now Reaches Across the Channel Into England.

London, Oct. 19.—The dead hand of Prof. Francisco Ferrer today reached from his grave in Spain across the channel into England and caused one of the stormiest sessions in the house of commons that has occurred for some time.

Bitter against Spain for her action, in executing Ferrer, Victor Grayson, a socialist member, attempted to move that the Spanish ambassador to England be expelled from Great Britain. The members of the house had been warned what to expect. When Grayson attempted to take the floor to put the motion he was prevented from doing so by the speaker and this action was the signal for the beginning of the storm. Members jumped to their feet and argued the point and the feeling became bitter between the two factions. Finally quiet was restored by the speaker, who refused to allow any member the floor who desired to address the house in connection with Grayson's proposed motion.
