

ARSTEL TRIAL IS ON TODAY

Sheriff Minto Says the Man is Idiotic Rather Than Insane—Evidence is Convincing.

Some new sensations were introduced in the Louis Arstel trial this morning, which began at 9 o'clock with Walter Winslow representing the state and Attorney P. H. D'Arcy counsel for Arstel, who is being tried on the indictment charging him with assault with a dangerous weapon with intent to rob.

Along in the latter part of July, so the indictment charges, Arstel held up J. J. McDonald, the Liberty grocery store proprietor, and after shooting at him twice, Arstel ran off into the brush and was caught the following day near Independence by Deputy Sheriff Esch and Sheriff Harry Minto, after a race through the brush and fields for a mile. Arstel was brought back to this city and when arraigned before Justice of the Peace Webster entered a plea of not guilty. During the examination Arstel made an extensive statement in which he attempted to clear himself of the crime by explaining his whereabouts at the time the hold-up occurred.

J. J. McDonald, the man who was made the victim of the hold-up, was the first witness for the state today. Mr. McDonald related his experience with Arstel, which was similar to his testimony in the justice of the peace court. He was positive that Arstel was the man, owing to his eyes (Arstel's) being the same as those which looked at McDonald over the blue and white handkerchief at the time of the hold-up and Arstel's build and the clothing introduced as testimony this morning during the trial.

Earle Huffman, a young man residing a short distance south of the Salem Heights school house and near the vicinity in which the hold-up occurred was called to the stand. Young Huffman stated that while he was walking down a trail beside the Liberty road on his way to town he saw Arstel sitting beside the road a few hours prior to the hold-up, and when asked if he recognized the defendant in court this morning Huffman answered in the affirmative. He also recognized the duster and hat Arstel wore at the time.

Sheriff Minto was then called by the state. The sheriff told the story of the capture of Arstel; how himself and Deputy Esch had seen Arstel run down behind the barn in front of which he was sitting at the time he and his deputy drove up in Independence and how Arstel was captured at the point of a gun after a lively chase. Sheriff Minto was then asked to state what Arstel's actions were, and his conduct while confined in the county jail. The officer said that the prisoner had been very troublesome and had to be watched all the time. When asked if he thought Arstel was a bright man, Sheriff Minto stated that he thought Arstel possessed just about as much brains at the present time as he did when born.

Deputy Sheriff Esch also testified to the chase and capture of Arstel.

Evidently Arstel had not reckoned with his "cellmates" during his time in the county jail with them. J. E. Hamlin, the forger who was sentenced to serve two years in the penitentiary by Judge Burnett last week and who was confined in the city jail six weeks, three of which he was a cellmate to Arstel, was brought in from the penitentiary this morning to testify concerning his conversation with Arstel. Hamlin said that Arstel told him the whole story of how he attempted to frighten McDonald by shooting straight up to induce McDonald to throw out his money. Attorney D'Arcy asked Hamlin concerning Arstel's insanity, but Attorney Walter Winslow objected to this as being incompetent on the grounds that Hamlin was incompetent to give expert testimony. Attorney Winslow's objection was sustained by Judge Burnett, who thought the witness should confine his testimony to what Arstel said.

H. A. Rycroft, another prisoner in the county jail pending a trial on the indictment charging him with kidnaping, was called to testify in behalf of the defendant. Rycroft became acquainted with Arstel while both were in the prison. The witness stated that he thought Arstel was insane for several reasons. Among Rycroft's reasons for thinking so was that he knew of Arstel walking in the prison, attempting to commit suicide and to fight the authorities.

Warden Curtiss of the institution was then called. Warden Curtiss' testimony somewhat put a damper on the insanity probabilities. While Arstel was in the penitentiary Warden Curtiss said that on one occasion he became unruly and a guard brought him to the head office. The guard, said Mr. Curtiss, thought Arstel either crazy or putting it on and the warden had the prisoner locked up in a cell and examined by the prison physician, who pronounced him perfectly sane. Arstel complained his curious actions by walking restlessly about his cell with heavy shoes on for the greater part of the night, after sleeping all day, and disturbing the other men who had worked all day. Warden Curtiss said he directed a guard to go and take Arstel's shoes off. The guard entered the cell and Arstel jumped on him and the guard laid him out with a club. The next day Arstel called Warden Curtiss and said he would give up first business as he saw he couldn't make it work and go back to his daily duties. Warden Curtiss testified that he did not think Arstel insane in the least.

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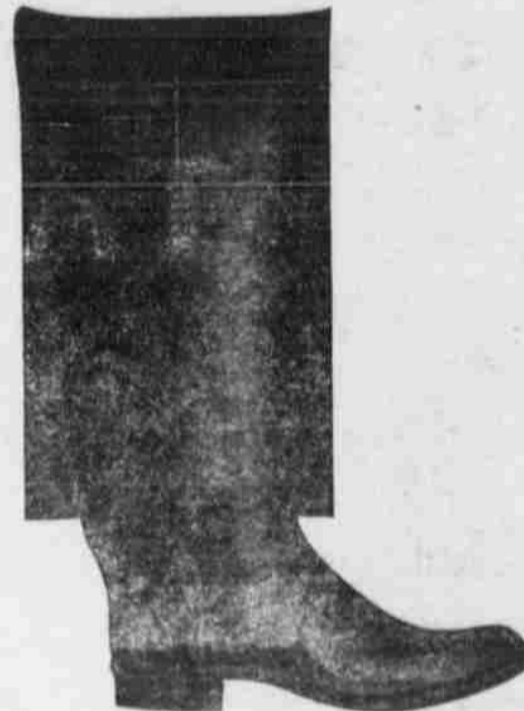
