## LEGISLATIVE TICKET IS CONSIDERED

It is recalled that Mr. Libby was one of the three state members who ran without opposition. It is probable that Mr. Libby and Mr. Patton can get the renomination if they desire it. Other men who are talked about some for representative are George Weeks of Chemawa precinct and C. M. Eppley, president of the Salem Business Men's League. It is believed that a ticket of strong business men will be shaped up that will be sent to the legislature to put on the brakes and cut down state taxes.

## OAKLAND WANTS ON STATE MAP

[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE.] Sacramento, Cal., Oct. 22.—According to the vigorous denial of State School Superintendent Hyatt, no promises have been made to the Oakland city officials that the new geography of the state, now being revised, will give Oakland more space than did the one before. "We intend to make a few corrections in the revised geography," said Hyatt, "but none to appease these ambitious bay cities. Changes in some data and topography and the results of the school census in the largest cities will be made. Otherwise the state board of education believes that it has met every reasonable objection." The school geography included but a short description of Oakland, and as a result the leading citizens of the municipality made strenuous objections to the issue. Subsequently it was recalled for revision.

## A PITIFUL STORY OF THE DESERT

Little Tracks Tell Pathetic Story of Lives Sacrificed to the Horrible Demon—Thirst.

[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE.] San Bernardino, Cal., Oct. 22.—A family of five persons—father, mother and three little children—have perished on the desert in the Carlsbad

Creek country, according to a report brought to this city today by T. H. Kellogg of Brawley.

While traversing the Carlsbad region, on his way to San Bernardino, Kellogg stumbled upon evidence that pointed to a terrible desert tragedy. By the side of the trail, twenty miles from the nearest water hole, he found an abandoned camp wagon and a dying horse. Tracks of five persons led from the wagon into the desert.

Kellogg followed these tracks for several miles. Three of the trails, he stated, were made by little feet. One of the children was barefooted. The other tracks were made by a man's and a woman's shoes. In search of water the doomed family had wandered into a section of the desert where water holes are unknown.

In the camp wagon found on the trail was nothing through which the names of the sufferers could be learned. Kellogg immediately retraced his steps to the nearest prospector's camp and several miners are now searching for the family.

## KERMIT TO VISIT NJORE

The combined parties will pass a few days here replenishing their outfits, after which they will start for Guzon Gushie, where they intend to hunt big game until the first week in November. The party expects to leave for the hunt next Monday. The remainder of November will be passed in the Njore region with Lord Del Ware.
