ANOTHER MEXICAN PATRIOT

Los Angeles, Cal., Oct. 22.—On October 15, while passing through this city, I took the trouble to investigate the case of L. Guiterrez De Lara, who had been arrested the Sunday before President Taft arrived, charged with being an "anarchist" was then out on bail, and I had a long talk with him at his residence.

The re-arrest of De Lara and the announced purpose of the government authorities to railroad him back to Mexico, has given a new interest to my investigation, and to the interview which I then secured.

De Lara is not an anarchist. He is a Mexican patriot. His only crime is the fact that he has dared to

criticize the Diaz government. This is a crime in Mexico; it is not such in the United States. De Lara came to the United States as a political refugee.

The United States is supposed to furnish political asylum for those who are persecuted beyond endurance in other countries. This Mexican has every right to expect immunity from political persecution while in the United States. Instead of this he has been persecuted, not only by agents of Mexico, but by officials of the United States. I am convinced that the present action against him is persecution, pure and simple. It is the same influence which ran down and finally landed in the Arizona penitentiary at Florence his compatriot, Rivera, and Villareal.

The following interview with De Lara was written before any information was received of De Lara's latest arrest:

"As you read in the papers, I was arrested while addressing an audience in the city square—the plaza. I was charged with nothing. The arrest was without warrant. I was talking to Mexicans about the misgovernment of Mexico. Also I was explaining the doctrines of Socialism. I have said the same things

hundreds of times. I am a paid lecturer of the Socialist party.

"I am not an anarchist. I made no threats against either President Taft or President Diaz. Not only have I made no threats against Diaz, but I would consider it a great misfortune to Mexico if anything happened to Diaz. I much prefer that he die a natural death. The cause of reform in Mexico will go forward much better thus.

"What do we seek? A return to the constitution of 1857 for free press and it forbade a standing army. It insured the people against a monopoly of the lands and against the conditions of peonage which have resulted from such a monopoly. A peaceful accomplishment of these reforms is what we have urged.

"No charge was made against me at the time of my arrest. I started habeas corpus proceedings, and, after three days' imprisonment, I am admitted to bail. During this im-

prisonment I am herded with dirty criminals in a crowded jail, and subject to the bullyings of brutalized police.

"Why am I arrested? Why was I arrested before? Why was I arrested when Morgan, Villareal and Rivera were arrested here in Los Angeles? Because the Mexican government wants me arrested. Because the Mexican government is persecuting political refugees, not only in Mexico but in the United States.

"The Mexican government is using the police and courts of the United States to pursue men like myself, whose only crime is to speak and work for a constitutional form of government in Mexico like that of the United States. Why does the American government assist Diaz in his political persecutions? What is the influence at work which nerves the American courts and the American police to arrest and prosecute men whose only offense is against
