term of four years, who shall serve until the first Monday in January, 1911, and until their successors are elected and qualified, as hereinafter provided."

Record of the Bill.

In the house there were 23 negative votes, of which 12 were cast by statement men, and only 10 by the anti-statement men.

In the senate there were only seven negative votes, of which four were cast by statement men and three by anti-statement men.

Record in the House.

Anti-statement people who supported the bill were Messrs. Hunt, Belknap, Bones, Brattain, Brooke, Buchanan, Mahoney, Mann, Mariner, McCue, McKinney, Meek, Mr. Speaker. Only 10.

Statement men against bill: Abbott, Bryant, Campbell, Connel, Dimick, Hattberg, Jones of Polk, Jensenweber, Muncy, Richardson, Rich, Jones of Douglas, Jones of Clackamas. Only 10 anti-statement men in the house voted against the bill.

Record in the Senate.

The bill was introduced by Senator Hart, of Baker, an anti-statement man. It was supported in the senate by anti-statement men: Chase Coffee, Cole, Frank J. Miller, Norton, Parrish, Schofield, Dr. J. N. Smith and President Bowerman. Statement men in the senate who voted against it were Bailey, Kay, Johnson and Milt Miller. Only three anti-statement men voted no, namely Beach, Merriman and Wood.

The Test Case Pending.

Attorney-General Crawford says: "The case in which it is being tested is the State vs. Sam Cochran, who was arrested at St. Johns for some violation of the local option law. He was tried in the Multnomah county circuit court and found guilty, and appealed to the supreme court. Justices McBride and Slater and King reversed the lower court. Justices Moore and Eakin dissented, sustaining the lower court. The state then moved for a mandate to issue sustaining the lower court and claiming that the dissenting opinion was the majority opinion of the supreme court on the ground that the legislature had no authority under the constitution to create two additional judgeships. No request has been made by any body of men

or by any party, as such, but many members of the bar and private citizens have urged the attorney-general to bring the proceeding to test the constitutionality of the act. This case does that without bringing any separate proceedings. The only motive, besides sustaining the lower court is that the people of the state are entitled to know whether the supreme court is constitutionally organized, and many members of the bar are anxious to have the question permanently settled."

School Land Scrap.

In spite of the fact that the state land board has increased the value on indemnity school lands, or school land scrip, from \$8.75 to \$10 per acre, the demand for these lands has not decreased appreciably and it is possible that the land board will further the valuation of the lands. There are between 80,000 and 90,000 acres of school land yet unsold, and at \$10 per acre, notwithstanding a probable increase, will add \$1,000,000 to the public school fund in a year's time over the amount that would be realized at \$8.75 per acre. School scrip is much more preferable than others, as only 1-5th of the purchase price is required and the balance in installments, but in railroad scrip full payment is required.
