

SEVENTH WARD BOOSTERS NOMINATE ALDEMAN

They Have a "Smoker" and Elect Officers for Ensuing Year—Voters Are Registered.

The Seventh Ward Improvement League had a smoker last night, and the club hall was well filled with some of the solid citizens who stand for better streets, sidewalks, crosswalks and progress generally.

The greatest enthusiasm prevailed, and N. D. Elliott was renominated as alderman, and John A. Carson was named for the vacancy to occur by the removal of Alderman E. Hofer to the fourth ward about December 1. The names of Elliott and Carson were received with great enthusiasm, and they will probably be chosen without opposition as the unanimous choice of the improvement club.

Officers of Club Chosen.
John A. Carson, in retiring from the presidency of the club, thanked his neighbors for the honor conferred on him by having been made its first president, and pledged his hearty support for the future progress of the ward. He said the people of the ward would be glad if they get their streets improved as good as Kearney street for the present, and regretted that all the streets asked to be improved were not reached by the city administration.

O. L. Townsend was chosen president, Amos Vass vice-president, Clyde Mason secretary-treasurer, an office which he has very ably filled the past year.

Full Width Streets.
Chairman Stolz, of the street committee, was the principal speaker of the evening, and dwelt on the importance of grading and macadamizing the streets full width. He denied that he was a candidate for mayor, and favored electing Mayor Rodgers for a third term, saying he was a man who had been perfectly honest in all his dealings with the city.

Alderman Elliott spoke briefly of

the labors performed for the ward. They had secured two first-class bridges for South Salem, and a sidewalk across from Fairmount Park to Twelfth street. He thought that there were others more competent to fill the place, and asked that the honors be passed around. But the others did not think so. The seventh ward was the first to ask for and secure a street improvement of crushed rock, and the first to make a fight for a public park. The park and paving over the hill to Mission street had been killed by men opposed to progress. If the ward wanted improvements it must send its best fighters to the city council.

H. M. Polsal, the grocer, made a splendid speech for progress, and told what had been done to advertise Salem in Seattle. He made a plea to build up Salem by building up the country. He was heartily applauded. Dr. Miles and Mr. Holder also made boost speeches. The latter advocated bitulithic pavement on South Commercial street to the city limits on the district plan. Coffee, sandwiches and cigars were served to all.

Deputy City Recorder Elgin was present and recorded all voters for the coming city election.

GENERAL HOWARD IS DEAD

Last of the Long List of Famous Union Generals to Pass Away—Was in This State.

Burlington, Vt., Oct. 27.—General Oliver O. Howard, last of the Union commanders of the Civil War, died suddenly at his home here tonight of heart disease. He was 79 years old.

To many of the pioneer residents of the Pacific Northwest the life and movements of General Howard are familiar, as they related to the early history of the Oregon country. At the time of the war with the Nez Perce Indians in 1877-8, General Howard for more than four years was commander of the department of the Columbia and directed the government forces against the redskins, who, under the leadership of Chief Joseph, were chased across the border into Canadian territory.
