THE ALDERMEN ARE BEING HATCHED OUT

General Demand Is to Secure First Class Business Men Without Strings on Them.

The annual city election when an alderman is chosen from each ward and vacancies on the city council are filled will be held the first Monday in December. So far no one has filed a candidate for alderman, as the people have grown weary of the men who seek these jobs. The demand of the people seems to be for first class business men, and that kind of men are being slowly selected and will be in most cases elected without opposition.

In the first ward "Shorty" Moffett will be returned and H. A. Johnson is to be elected to fill the vacancy caused by Fred Waters moving out of the ward. In the second ward Arthur S. Benson, deputy clerk of the

supreme court, is being urged to run by his friends and he has hosts of them. If he will accept he cannot be beaten. In the fourth ward the general demand is to keep Walter S. Low in office. He is one of the old guard of firemen and has a reputation for managing a first class fire department that extends all up and down the Pacific coast. In the fifth ward there are many aspirants for Mr. Presnell's seat. Ex-Alderman Jacobs may be asked to take it again. In the sixth ward there is no man who attends to the public duties any better than Mr. Greenbaum, the present alderman. In the seventh ward Mr. N. D. Elliott will be returned without opposition.

LOOKING FOR THE BILKER

Sacramento, Cal., Oct. 28.—Rev. Frank Baker, Methodist minister, and Richard Timm, a planing mill operator, are looking today for a bunco man who "cleaned" them of several dollars each by exhibiting a letter which he represented as having been written by Governor Gillette.

The fellow first appeared at Baker's home and stated that he had just completed a 15-year sentence in the penitentiary. He showed a letter signed by Governor Gillette, and another bearing the signature of Assemblyman Sackett, which spoke highly of the man. As the recommendations were written on official stationery, both Baker and Timm had no suspicion that the man was otherwise than he represented himself to be, and they readily parted with money to help him on his way. Baker contributed a small sum, while Timm paid for the fellow's transportation to Chico, Cal. Later it was discovered that they had been made the victims of a clever, schemer, who had forged the name of the governor and that of the assemblyman.

NEW YORK ELECTION INTERESTING

New York, Oct. 28.—The officials at the headquarters of all three mayoralty candidates issued confidential replies today, but they all admitted to their confidential friends that the situation is ticklish.

Never before have such reports been received from the district captains.

While the betting shows Judge Gaynor, the Tammany candidate, the favorite at two to one, Leader Murphy is having the time of his life holding the organization in line.

The odds show Hearst and Otto Bannard at even chances for the second place.

So little betting is being done, however, that it is alleged that Tammany is holding up the odds on Gaynor for effect.

The situation is so peculiar—with the republicans backing Bannard and Hearst, having been nominated as an independent, splitting the civic alliance forces—that any day's developments may change the whole prospect.

WANT JAPANESE SO COME TO AMERICA

Seattle, Oct. 28.—Strong efforts are to be made in Japan to reopen the flood gates to the free emigration of Japanese to the United States, according to information which reached here today by the steamer Tango Maru. The effort will be made in connection with the approaching treaty revision by Japan and it will be sought to have removed the last clause of Article II of the treaty with the United States, which now prevents the emigration of Japanese, except under certain stringent restrictions to America.

TWO DEAR AND FOURTEEN HURT

New York, Oct. 28.—Two persons were burned to death and fourteen others were seriously injured today in a fire of incendiary origin which destroyed two three-story tenement houses on East Fifteenth street. The dead:

HERMAN TIEDT, aged 34 years.
EMMA TIEDT, his wife, aged 27.
Those who are responsible for the blaze made careful preparations. Oil was poured over the floors in the basements and lower floor of one of the buildings and piles of inflammable articles were piled in a back room, where the fire was started. The police are now scouring the vicinity for the guilty persons.
The loss will total \$50,000.
