MISSISSIPPI FLEET IS DELAYED

President Taft and His Party Will Not Reach Vicksburg Until Very Late in the Night.

(UNITED PRESS ASSOCIATES WIRE.)
Memphis, Tenn., Oct. 27.—Shore behind his time, President Taft, who is due to arrive at Vicksburg at 3 o'clock this afternoon, will probably not arrive there until dusk this evening. This means that the Commander, with the president aboard, and the fleet carrying the 24 governors and congressmen, as well as other delegates to the waterways convention in New Orleans, will sail down the Mississippi river without making a stop, and Vicksburg is reached this evening.

The delay has been caused by the inability of the accompanying fleet of river craft to maintain the pace set by the President. On account of this fact the president is three hours behind his schedule.

The President, leaving President Taft, passed this city at 11 o'clock this afternoon, and at the rate the river craft is now traveling will reach Vicksburg about 1 o'clock tonight. The time other vessels making up the fleet bearing the congressmen and senators on the waterway convention in New Orleans are struggling behind, unable to keep up with the ship bearing the president.

President Taft and the other members of the party hope to assemble outside of New Orleans in time to make a triumphal entry into the city at noon Saturday.

CANNON IS DOWN AND OUT

Chicago, Oct. 24.—A dispatch received today by the Chicago Tribune from Helena, Ark., says that the congressmen and senators accompanying President Taft down the Mississippi river, en route to the waterways convention in New Orleans, have told Joe Cannon of Illinois that if he again is a candidate for re-election as speaker of the house of representatives that the success of the republican party will become endangered. The dispatch says that at a conference aboard the "Quincy" last night that it was decided that the only hope for Cannon was for President Taft to come to his aid, as he did for Senator Aldrich in his Wisconsin speech.

It is generally believed, however, that there is little chance of President Taft going to Cannon's aid.

"It is too early to make predictions for the next campaign at this time. As chairman of the national committee I cannot go on record as the supporter of any prospective candidate."

Governor Harman of Ohio and Governor Marshall of Indiana are both big men, and their names undoubtedly will be mentioned at the next democratic national convention."

Guillermo de Lara, the Mexican Socialist, who is in jail here, charged with being an alien anarchist, today filed a new bond for the release of the prisoner, following the refusal of Immigration Inspector Ridgway to accept the first bond, because of error in its construction.

Ridgway stated today that the new bond would be investigated immediately, but refused to state when his decision would be announced. Holman is confident that the bond will prove satisfactory, and that de Lara will be released before night.

Clarence Darrow, the Chicago attorney, who defended Moyer, Pettibone and Haywood in their trial for the alleged murder of Governor Steunenberg, of Idaho, will come to Los Angeles to defend L. Gutierrez de Lara in his hearing before Immigration Inspector Ridgway, if the members of the de Lara Defense League deem it necessary.

Word from the Chicago attorney was received today by the officers of the League, and Darrow is awaiting a reply from them.
