Oakland, Cal., Oct. 29.—County records here show that a license to marry was issued on May 13, 1968. to Webber H. Parkinson and Anna R. Scott. The county recorder said this afternoon that he could find nothing to show that the wedding had taken place.

Mr. and Mrs. Parkinson lived in Berkeley last winter, and remained there until the death of their baby, March 22, 1909. He was in bust ness at Goldfield, and made frequent trips between Berkeley and that cliy. It is understood by the neighbors that they had been married four years ago in Tacoma, Wash. and that Mrs. Parkinson's sister lived there. She also told the neighbors that she had relatives near Minneapolis. After the child died the household goods were sold and it was said that he returned to Goldfield, and that she went to visit her relatives. The baby was five months old when it died.
