SAVANTS TO HOLD SEANCE

Seattle, Wash., Oct. 29.—Dr. E. O. Sisson, of the department of education, and H. C. Stevens, of the department of psychology of the University of Washington, are arranging a joint psychological clinic, in which backward and defective children will be examined. The purposes of the clinic is primarily to discover the causes of the defect in the patients, with a further aim toward effecting a cure. All parents of defective children are urged to co-operate in the work by bringing them to the class. Examinations are made before a regular class of students in psychology and education held each Saturday morning in the psychological laboratory in Science Hall.

There are only a few such clinics in the United States, but they have already a tremendous advance in locating the cause of and providing a remedy for mental defectiveness.

DIVORCE IS SURELY WANTED

For the first time in a good many days divorce proceedings have been filed in the circuit court. Anna Harlow is the complainant in articles filed this morning, and asks that the court dissolve the bonds of matrimony between herself and Charles T. Harlow on the grounds of cruel and inhuman treatment.

It is alleged in the complaint that they were married in Marietta, Ohio, and shortly afterward moved to the coast and settled in this city, where they have lived for one year. One child, a boy of 10 is the issue of the marriage. The plaintiff asks that \$75 be given her for attorney's fees, while an additional sum of \$10 per

month, permanent alimony, is demanded, and a restriction made by the court preventing the defendant from interfering with the plaintiff in removing any household effects. Attorney Heltzel appears for the plaintiff.

THE MOB MISSED THIS OPPORTUNITY

London, Oct. 29.—Aviator Blierot and his manager, Mueller, narrowly escaped death Wednesday at the hands of a mob at Bucharest, Roumania, according to letters received here today.

The mob was disappointed when the motor in his machine balked and Blierot was unable to make flight. He and his manager were attacked by the mob and before they were rescued by gendarmes Mueller had been beaten into unconsciousness.

THE NEGRO MISSED THE GATHERING

A colored gentleman called at the sheriff's office this morning and before Deputy Sheriff Babe Needham had an opportunity of telling him that he was in the wrong per the caller related a long tale of woe concerning his experience while in Oregon City yesterday.

It appears that the colored man had landed from the train in Oregon City, where he was met by one of the city police officers, who gave him orders to take the next train out of town, and be sure not to make any miscalculations either, which the traveler complied with. When the negro was informed that the sheriff of Marion county had no power over the Clackamas county officers he realized that it required a higher executive to deal out justice in the case. The negro said that when he arrived in Oregon City he was intending to go to work as a cook in one of the city hosteries, but the unceremonious request to leave deprived him of the job, and he thought a hearing before some higher tribunal would result in a reprimand of the officer and a re-instatement of himself in Oregon City.

A WHOLE WAD OF CORPORATE BUSINESS

Beginning next Monday there will be three different terms of court set. Judge Burnett of department No. 1 of the circuit court will call the circuit court chamber to order; Judge Galloway of department No. 2 will hold court in the county court room, while the county court and commissioners will meet in the adjoining room in their regular first Wednesday session.

Judge Burnett will hold an adjourned term Monday, in which there are three cases of importance at issue. George Meyers will probably be tried on the indictment charging him with murder in the first degree to which there was a plea entered of not guilty; A. B. Smith will either be granted a new trial or receive sentence, the case being postponed in order for the court to hold under advisement a motion for rehearing, and Burton Mills, charged in an indictment of larceny from a building, will have another hearing some time next week.

Judge Galloway, who presides over department No. 2, has one of the heaviest dockets in the history of that department.

The case of Frank Ford against the Oregon Electric Railway company is pending, in which the plaintiff is suing the railroad company to force the specific performance of contract by constructing a station on the Ford farm, near Lake Labish, as alleged to have been a provision in a contract permitting the company to build their railway line through the farm. In an answer filed by the defendant company they allege that to build a station at this point would be an inconvenience to the public and impracticable. The case will come up for adjudication this term, probably this term of court. The court overruled the plaintiff's motion to strike out defendant's answer and a demurrer to the defendant's further and separate answer was also overruled.

Other cases in the docket for this term are: State against Southern Pacific company, a mandamus proceeding; Corvallis & Eastern Rail-

road company vs. State Land Board, injunction suit; Geo. L. Rose et al. against City of Salem, injunction.

GREECE FACES A NATIONAL REVOLUTION

Athens, Oct. 29.—Leading a revolt looking to the enforcement of a demand that all the higher officers of the Grecian navy retire, a naval officer named Typaldos, heading 300 men today seized the naval arsenal at Salamis.

Typaldos and his followers are fortifying the place in an effort to resist attempts to dislodge them.

Practically all of the younger officers are in sympathy with the revolt. They claim that many of the older officers are too old and unfit for service.

The outbreak undoubtedly is part of an anti-dynastic movement, but the military league, which is fostering the movement, denounces Typaldos as a traitor. They claim that he acted prematurely, and has upset their plans.

This move, many believe, will force the hand of the military league, and cause an immediate revolution.

GREAT PANAMA DIVER IN TOWN

E. J. McDevitt arrived in the city today. He claims to come direct from Panama, and was in the Philippines of J. C. Welch, the diver on the government snagboat Mathloma. He is headed for Alaska, and says the Panama country has a fine climate, and the canal is the greatest work of the age. Vessels, instead of sailing around the horn, through thousands of miles of stormy seas, will cross the isthmus in calm water, and save months of time. Mr. McDevitt hopes to find his old friend Welch before leaving for the north.

This Is a Case of Maybe.

Nevada City, Cal., Oct. 29.—With a revolver clutched in his hand the dead body of George Bailey, a prominent resident of this city and a man well known in fraternal circles, was found dead on the floor of the city jail here today with a bullet through his head. Bailey was arrested last night while in a state of alleged intoxication. He is a native of this city. Bailey, who was 50 years old, was a member of a number of lodges.

WANT TO GET THEIR INTEREST

Willing to See Welsh Pardoned as Long as Their Interest Is Guaranteed Them Every Year.

Walsh, who has been convicted of misusing the funds of the wrecked Chicago National bank, failed to make good to the clearing house banks of Chicago the interest due on the note for \$7,000,000, which he issued in their favor, there seems to be no disposition on the part of the institutions to foreclose.

It is understood that his creditors will allow Walsh more time to dispose of his railroad holdings so that they will get more interest money.
