ALL ARE ON WAY TO RECOVERY

Officer Johnson Is Out on Crutches and the Convicts Recovering from Wounds.

Mike Nicholich and Albert Ferris, two of the five convicts who escaped from the guards at the school for the feeble minded on Friday, the 15th of this month, and who were both wounded when captured, are doing nicely at the penitentiary hospital, and their ultimate recovery is assured by the physicians, provided no unforeseen complications set in.

Albert Ferris was shot in the wrist by Emory James, one of the men hunters, during the fierce battle in the timber two miles south of Buena Vista, which cost the life of Carter, the escapee who was shot through the head. Ferris is able to move about the prison now, but the nerve-racking chase and the gunshot wound cut down his strength considerably.

Mike Nicholich, the convict who succeeded in eluding the officers immediately prior to the battle in the timber, but who was captured later, after being shot through the hip and wrist, is also gaining strength, notwithstanding the severe shock from the wounds, and the many days he wandered about without food or shelter. The physicians are compelled to use careful methods of treatment with Nicholich, and had not the convict's physical condition been in the best of shape before making the break for liberty, it is doubtful whether he would have pulled through. Nicholich is permitted to sit up a short time each day, and partake of some light food.

JUDGE WORKS TO DEFEND DE LARA

[UNITED PRESS LEARNED WIRE.]

Los Angeles, Oct. 30.—John S. Works, formerly judge of the California supreme court, will act as chief advisory counsel for L. Gutierrez de Lara, the Mexican liberal, in the fight he will make against deportation. It was announced that Judge Works

will work with Attorney Clarence Melly and A. R. Holston in behalf of de Lara, and probably conduct the examination of witnesses at his hearing before Immigration Inspector Ridgway.

Ridgway has not yet announced the date of hearing, but it is thought it will be scheduled late next week.

De Lara spent last evening in securing witnesses among Mexicans, who listened to the address he delivered at the Los Angeles Plaza the evening of the first arrest—October 10. It was charged that at this meeting he was guilty of anarchistic utterances, and he was arrested and held upon a charge of disturbing the peace until the arrival from Washington of an order to arrest him as an alien anarchist.
