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## COMMITTEE SUBMITS REPORT

### Also Turns Over Fine Building Which is the Substantial Evidence of Work. Open Friday.

Salem, Ore., Nov. 6, 1909. Hon. Board of Directors, Salem Public Schools:

Gentlemen—We, the undersigned building committee, appointed by your chairman to take charge of the construction of the new Garfield school building, beg leave to submit the following report:

We have kept constantly in touch with the construction work on said building from the time the foundation was being laid until the final completion of the building.

Said building is now fully completed and the workmanship and material are of a highly satisfactory character.

The contractors have complied with the plans and specifications, except in a few minor instances, and we recommend that the board accept the building.

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## ELEVATOR CRUSHED HIS HEAD

### Marshall Hammer at the Asylum Lets His Head Be Caught by Ascending Elevator.

Marshall Hammer, a young man employed at the asylum as third cook, sustained a fractured jaw and a painfully bruise head yesterday afternoon as the result of getting caught between a bar on the freight elevator and the flooring.

Hammer was standing in the elevator when it started to rise and was leaning with his chin on a cross-bar. He failed to notice the floor approaching and was caught firmly by the jaws and his unthinking head. He was released from his dangerous position as soon as possible and removed to the hospital quarters, where his injuries were attended to. Hammer was unconscious, but it is thought he will survive the accident.

## BARNES SAID SHE HAD LEFT

### He Knew It Because He Had Beaten Her Brains Out With a Pick Handle. Fiendish Crime.

[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE.] Walla Walla, Wash., Nov. 12.—Barnes was hanged at 6:30 o'clock this morning by the order of Mrs. Anna Aldrich April 30, 1908.

He walked to the scaffold with a nervous step and although he stumbled twice and swayed while being strapped, he needed no assistance. Father Jones, his spiritual adviser, accompanied him. The trap was sprung simultaneously by five guards and thirteen and a half minutes later Barnes was pronounced dead.

About 500 people tried to gain admittance, but only newspaper men, officers and clergymen were admitted. He murdered Mrs. Aldrich, who was 70 years old, to gain possession of her land. He was twice tried for the crime, the first jury disagreeing.

It was on April 30, 1908, that Barnes enticed Mrs. Aldrich to accompany him to a lonely spot in Coppel canyon, where he beat out her brains with a pick handle he had purchased for the purpose.

Barnes was employed by Mrs. Aldrich and reported to her that he wanted to rent one of her places, called the Keeney ranch, on Coppl creek.

Making these representations, he induced the old lady to accompany him in a buggy which he hired from a livery stable in Watsburg, to the ranch in the lonely canyon. The drive necessitated their going through Dixie, and there Barnes bought the pick handle, which he carried with him when he was told it was slightly worn-eaten, that it was good enough for his purpose.

When he reached the lonely spot in the canyon the wheel tracks showed he had come. Mrs. Aldrich was induced to get out of the buggy. The ground showed marks of a struggle, and her hair combs, purse and other articles were strewn about the ground. After Barnes had broken her skull in, literally beating out her brains, he threw the body into hole caused by the uprooting of a tree. Here it was found four days afterward by a searching party.

Barnes was arrested and accused of the crime. He had been seen going through the canyon with Mrs. Aldrich and returning afterward without her. He had told several people that she had gone away. His stories were conflicting and the evidence seemed clear. Insanity was his plea.

## MONEY FOR OPENING COLUMBIA
