DECLARES BONDS ARE FORFEITED

City Sues Surety Company for
Failure of Home Telephone
Co. to Install System.

City Attorney Walter E. Keyes has filed a complaint in the county clerk's office in which it is alleged that the Home Telephone Company has forfeited its bonds of \$5000 in all, in failing to take action in the construction of the automatic telephone system within the time specified in the franchise granted by the city council. The council considered the violation of the franchise and decreed that nothing was done by the defendant until November 15, and, therefore, decided to declare a forfeiture of the bonds. Attorneys C. L. and John H. McNary appear as associates to Attorney Keyes in the case.

YAMHILL IS FIRST IN WALNUT EXHIBIT

"Yamhill Against the World." Once more has Old Yamhill demonstrated her ability to cope with all rivals, having captured the gold medal at the A. Y. P. exposition recently held at Seattle. A year ago it was decided by the Yamhill Walnut Club of McMinnville to make an exhibit of English walnuts at Portland and following that to take the collection to Spokane and Seattle. The nuts were secured from different parts of the county and arranged in a tasteful manner and eventually were viewed by many thousands of people, many of whom heard the name of Yamhill and McMinnville for the first time. The result was this locality won the highest honors.

This week the Walnut Club held a meeting and again decided upon making a display of this famous shell fruit at Portland, at the horticultural show, December 6-8. In fact, the

nuts had already been secured, according to action at a previous meeting, and the club decided to stand all the expense incurred in getting the nuts and preparing them for an attractive exhibit, but asked the Development League to stand the expense of the trip and care of the shipment from the time it left McMinnville until it was again returned here.

The executive committee of the Development League held a meeting, and, realizing the value to the city and county, readily agreed to meet the required expense, and preparation is going forward rapidly under the supervision of Secretary Cooper and a committee appointed by the Walnut Club. Some members of the club will no doubt accompany the display to Portland to see that full justice is done it, and proper care taken. After the Portland fair all will be returned to this place and be kept in the club rooms here.—McMinnville News-Reporter.

ROSEDALE WANTS NEW HIGHWAY

Another new county road is being sought by the Rosedale people by petition to the county court. The petition was filed yesterday afternoon by Ada Jory and others, asking that the court establish a road directly through the thickly cultivated prairie district from the intersection of the Rosedale county road to Prospect Hill road. The court will probably give this matter consideration tomorrow or on Friday, the regular road day. The Rosedale district is being built up gradually with homes, and the large tracts are being subdivided in sections for the accommodation of many small growers of prunes.

ANOTHER MURDER MYSTERY

Auburn, California, Seems to
Be in Throes of Murder Epidemic.

Auburn, Cal., Nov. 30.—With the Alma Bell trial yet fresh in the minds of the residents of this little city, and Jeff Lewis now on trial for the murder of Ben Sweeney, Auburn today is confronted with a murder mystery which the officers admit has baffled all their efforts at solution.

Despite the ceaseless work of men who were detailed upon the case, no clue has been obtained to the identity of the men who Monday evening shot and killed Dave Fletcher at Lander station, near here. Fletcher's body was found on the railroad tracks with two bullet holes through the skull. That robbery was not the motive of the crime was proven by the fact that the man's valuable had not been touched.

His long spikes caught in the ground twisting his leg and snapping a bone a few inches above his ankle. Physicians stated that it is doubtful if the catcher will be able to do heavy work for his club when the 1910 season begins.

Bliss formerly was a member of the Oakland club of the Coast League. He was drafted by St. Louis three years ago.

WOMAN IN FIGHT WITH A THIEF

Los Angeles, Cal., Nov. 30.—Following an exciting battle with a would-be thief at the corner of Fourth and Spring streets, in the heart of the business section of the city, last night, Mrs. Elizabeth Osgood is at her home today recovering from an ugly bruise on the side of the head, where she was struck by the robber. Her assailant, Harry Stewart, is in jail charged with attempted robbery.

Mrs. Osgood was standing on the corner waiting for her husband. She had just drawn \$150 from the Night and Day bank. The money was in her handbag.

Suddenly Stewart ran up and seized the bag. Mrs. Osgood succeeded in wrenching it away from him. While she warded off Stewart's blows with one hand Mrs. Osgood tossed the bag to a woman friend and then turned her attention to her assailant. Stewart was captured by the police.

SAVED FOR 14 YEARS TO SECURE A DIVORCE

St. Paul, Minn., Nov. 30.—After saving for fourteen years to obtain the necessary to secure a divorce, from Jos. Taylor, who she charged with "cruel and inhuman treatment." The decree was granted by Judge Booth. Three minutes were occupied in taking testimony in the case. Mrs. Taylor left her husband in 1895 and since then has been earning her own living. During that time she saved every cent possible from her meagre earnings with the view of obtaining the divorce which was granted yesterday.

Brave Girl Saves Child.

New York, Nov. 30.—Remarkable luck and the bravery and presence of mind of Bertha Rosenthal saved the life of Cecilia Snyder, a 2-year-old child, who fell from the window of a moving Second avenue elevated train directly between the dreaded third rail and an inner car rail just in front of the northbound platform. Miss Rosenthal, who was on the southbound platform, noticed the child lying on the track, and, throwing aside her fur and jacket, she leaped upon the track and made her way across the rails to the baby. She found Cecilia tightly wedged between the rails, but by summoning all her strength she succeeded in tearing her loose just before a train came rushing into the station. Cecilia was little hurt, and was soon restored to her distracted parents.

in Southern Oregon.
