Preference will be given to articles of Oregon production, condition, quality and price being equal.

When a particular article or brand is specifically called for, such article or brand shall have the preferential right to be considered, but bids on other articles or brands equally good may be considered at the discretion of the board.

The right is reserved by the board to reject any or all bids or to accept or reject any part of a bid.

No bids will be considered unless on blanks furnished by the undersigned.

All goods must be in original packages when possible. Goods to be delivered at the Oregon Institute for the Blind within ten days after the contract is awarded.

Bids will be opened at the Capitol, at Salem, December 23, 1909, at 3 o'clock p. m.
