

"REBELS" PREPARED TO FIGHT

Washington, Dec. 18.—Encouraged by the sentiment they found at their respective homes this summer and the general Western discontent with the Payne-Aldrich tariff law, the so-called insurgents or progressive members of the republican party, are here in force prepared to fight the organization in both houses to a standstill in this session of Congress.

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The fight against the organization in the special session last summer was necessarily confined to the tariff bill, but this winter the republicans will split on several issues. The postal savings bank, the tariff commission idea, reform in interstate commerce legislation, and several other things that were promised by the platforms of both parties, will be storm centers, after the regular appropriation bills are disposed of and perhaps in between times.

The big problem for the progressives in the House is how to get a vote on any of these or kindred issues. The rules under which the lower house of congress does business were framed so that recognition of a member is left to the Speaker—and if the organization of the house wants to discourage amendments to measure the congressman who is anxiously clamoring to present one finds that he can't catch the Speaker's eye.

Then, too, the house considers only those measures that are reported by committees. All the business of the house is framed up in committee. Their meetings are secret, and if the majority desires to kill a bill, it is simply left in a convenient pigeon-hole to die a natural death. And all the king's horses cannot force a report either favorably or unfavorably so as to give the house a chance to vote on it.

What will probably happen is that the insurgents, aided and abetted by the democrats, will use every parliamentary device known to legislation to pry loose some part of the machine.

In the senate, it is a little different. With but ninety members, the upper house proceeds on rules that allow any member to talk as long as he wants about anything or nothing, and to offer amendments to any bill that may be up. Senator Aldrich thinks that he can hold his forces in line as well as he did when the tariff bill was up. The insurgents, led by Cummins and LaFollette say that the tariff was a party measure, and they point with pride to the dents that the tariff discussion left in the armor of the Senator from Rhode Island. A Remarkable Memory.

Edwards tells a most remarkable story of a lawsuit between the United States and Mexico, wherein an advocate expected to secure millions of indemnity from our government for the incursions of Indians on her soil. Thousands of papers were examined and at last his trust in his memory was vindicated. The paper was found and the new Mexico claim was set aside by the English judge.
