CITY WITHOUT DUMPING GROUNDS

According to the report of Chief of Police Gibson, the city is without an available dumping ground at present for the disposition of rubbish. The chief said this morning that the city is very badly in need of a place to dump its garbage at present and many hundreds of loads of dirt and trash could be cleaned up about the city, but under the present conditions, it would be useless to have this garbage collected, as there is no place to dispose of it.

Chief Gibson stated that a Salem man hauled a load of garbage about the suburbs of the city for three hours recently in search of a place where he could deposit the load, and was compelled to take it back to his place.

"There is no one who will take chances of dumping garbage on another man's property, and run the risk of arrest," said the chief this morning, "and what we need is a suitable place where the people can dump their garbage, in order to give the city a thorough cleaning."

COMMENDS COMMISSION FOR GOOD WORK

The railroad commission today received a letter from H. N. Dryer, of Umatilla, who some time ago preferred a complaint against the railroad facilities of the Oregon Railroad and Navigation Company, at Umatilla, and for which a hearing had been set on January 11.

The letter is in response to a notice of the hearing sent to Mr. Dryer, and is strong in its commendation of the work accomplished by the commission in securing better railroad facilities for Umatilla. In his letter Mr. Dryer says that the railroad company immediately after receiving a communication with relation to its services set about improving them, and that it has installed a complete lighting plant of hollow wire gasoline, that a night agent has been appointed to look after the comfort of the passengers; a watchman put on duty at the waiting room and depot to free them from undesirable characters, and also that the company has given assurance of establishing a ladies' waiting room. Mr. Dryer commends the commission very highly on its labors.

Proposals for Wood for State Institutions

The Boards of Trustees of the several state institutions, located at or near the city of Salem, invite sealed bids for wood for the year 1910, as follows:

4500 cords of first and second-growth fir, to be delivered at Oregon State Insane Asylum.

1500 cords of first and second-growth fir, to be delivered at Oregon State Insane Cottage Farm.

1300 cords first and second-growth fir, 100 cords of grub oak, to be delivered at Oregon State Penitentiary.

650 cords of first and second-growth fir (first growth preferred) to be delivered at the State Institution for Feeble Minded.

450 cords of first and second-growth fir, to be delivered at Capitol building.

650 cords of first and second-growth fir and 50 cords of grub oak, to be delivered at Oregon State Reformatory School.

135 cords of slab wood, 5 cords of grub oak and 10 cords of first growth fir, to be delivered at Oregon State Blind School.

400 cords of first and second-growth fir, to be delivered at Oregon School for Deaf Mutes (new location).

Switch connections with the Southern Pacific Company enables bidders to deliver wood in carload lots at the Oregon State Insane Asylum and Penitentiary.

Sealed bids will be received for all or any part of the above. Cord wood must be cut while green from sound timber, four feet long, reasonably straight, and well seasoned, delivered as designated at or near the places designated, closely corded with bulkheads.

Each bid must be accompanied by a certified check, payable to the clerk, or cash equal to 25 cents per cord, to be forfeited to the state as damages in case the bidder receiving the award shall fail to execute a contract to deliver the wood and furnish a satisfactory bond. Successful bidders will be required within ten days after notification of acceptance of bid to enter into a contract to furnish a satisfactory bond. Bidders should be careful to state in their bids the name of the institution and the kind and number of cords to be furnished. Bids must be sealed in envelopes, endorsed "Proposals for wood," and addressed to the undersigned. Any further information may be had of the undersigned.

The right to reject any or all bids, or any part of a bid, and to waive defects in any bids, if it be deemed to the interest of the state to do so, is reserved by the Boards of Trustees.

Bids will be opened at the Executive Chambers, State Capitol, Salem, Oregon, on December 20, 1909, at 3 p. m.
