

ALDERMAN CHOICE OF TEACHERS

On March 19th of this year Chas. H. Jones, editor of the Oregon Teachers' Monthly sent out circular letters to each of the county superintendents, asking them to nominate candidates for state school superintendent. The superintendents responded quite generally, and the following candidates were named: L. R. Alderman, Eugene; E. D. Ressler, Corvallis; A. J. Churchill, Baker City; R. F. Robinson, Portland, and P. L. Campbell, Eugene. Mr. Jones took these candidates as a basis for a "straw vote," he printed a voting coupon in the June number of the Oregon Teachers' Monthly, and asked the teachers of the state to indicate their choice, and send the coupons to him. The contest ended on December 25. In the January number of the Oregon Teachers' Monthly Mr. Jones will make the following announcement:

"The Oregon Teachers' Monthly's straw voting contest for state school superintendent closed on December 25. While the votes have not been so large as expected, it has been large enough to show the choice of the teachers. Altogether 1699 votes were cast, and each county in the state was represented, except Curry and Lake. The votes were fairly well distributed, and the following are the results obtained: L. R. Alderman, 316; E. D. Ressler, 218; R. F. Robinson, 182; P. L. Campbell, 139; A. J. Churchill, 101; scattering, 53. The vote from the first to last has been quiet and orderly, and devoid of excitement. The candidates in no way have taken any special interest in the matter. So far as we know, no solicitation or pressure or pressure by them has been brought to bear upon any of the teachers. The candidates were all well known to the teachers, and they have been free to vote for their choice without fear or favor. Several months ago the Oregon Teachers' Monthly made the statement that we would support the choice of the teachers, and it is with pleasure that we reaffirm this statement. Mr. Alderman has been selected by a large majority; we congratulate him upon his popularity among the teachers."

Sewerage System as Outlined by the Salem City Engineer

City Engineer J. B. Perrott has prepared for Alderman N. D. Elliott, chairman of the sewer committee, the following statement of the proposed sewer system for the city of Salem:

"In reference to the South Salem sewer system, and the location of the main sewers in the district, although I have not sufficient data, at the present time to determine the exact position of the sewers, it appears to me that the probably position of the main sewer for that portion of South Salem lying west and east of High street would run down High street to Mission, from Mission to Bellevue, thence following South Mill creek to the Willamette slough, and along the Willamette slough to the outlet below Ferry street.

"This sewer will have laterals connecting with it from the east and west.

"The main sewer draining East Salem should be laid on Bellevue street with laterals running to the north and south. This main sewer should connect with and have the same outlet as the High street sewer.

"The sewer draining Yew Park district and the low-lying district be-

tween Yew Park and High street, one should be located on Twelfth street and another extending through Pleasant Home addition, Tuxedo addition and Nob Hill Annex.

"These should be carried to intercept the sewer on Bellevue street.

"The sewer draining the southeast portion of that district should connect with the Bellevue sewer at Fifteenth street, and should extend south on Fifteenth street to Oak street, then following the Turner Road to Water street, along Water street to Shelton street, and continuing east to the city limits.

"It is evident that for the extent of the district which his system will embrace that it will not be practical to construct a sewer large enough for storm water and sanitary purposes. The system should be constructed for sanitary purposes alone. Storm water should be carried from the streets to the nearest creek, and as there are quite a number of these in this district, it will be the cheapest and most effective manner of handling it."

Alderman Elliott has made a hard fight to get a comprehensive sewerage system established for the Capital City.
