

WANTS MAJOR RETURNED TO HIS POST

[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE.]
Washington, D. C., Jan. 26.—Charges that he is using his position in the army to lobby Alaskan measures through congress are basis for a demand resting with Secretary Dickinson, of the war department, today, that an order be issued assigning Major W. P. Richardson to his post in Alaska.

The demand is made by Delegate James Wickersham, who declares that Major Richardson once intimated that only their respective official positions prevented him from attacking the delegate.

"He said that only his position as an officer in the army and my position as a delegate to congress protected me," Delegate Wickersham is reported as saying.

"I shall perform my duty as a delegate from Alaska without fear of assault from Major Richardson, but I protest against being threatened in the capital by any officer in the army for daring to perform such duty."

Major Richardson is chairman of the Alaskan road commission. He is charged by Wickersham with exerting too much influence upon congressional committees.

Wickersham declares that, while the Alaskan council bill was pending before congress, Richardson attempted to influence legislation in favor of certain parts of it, although he was in Washington ostensibly as

an officer on business pertaining to the territory.
He says Richardson endeavored to perpetuate himself as chairman of the roads commission.

TACOMA WOULD FLY HIGH

Tacoma, Wash., Jan. 26.—Committees representing the Chamber of Commerce and the Commercial Club today began the work of raising \$15,000, the amount needed to insure an aviation meet in this city. The committee has wired Dick Ferris asking him for the earliest date that the aviators can come here and in the meantime a suitable place for the "fly" will be selected. The ball park, which is the largest in the northwest may be used as the starting place, although many favor the open prairie at American Lake, south of the city.

WAR VETAN PASSES AWAY

J. S. Irwin, whose death was announced in this morning's Oregonian, was for a time a resident of the Corvallis vicinity, and is well known to the older people of this section. The Oregonian says: "Joseph Randall Kerr Irwin, aged 74 years, an Oregon pioneer, died at the Good Samaritan hospital, Thursday. Mr. Irwin crossed the plains as a boy in 1852, coming to Linn county and settling at Oakville. He was kidnaped by the Indians during the journey, but was later rescued by the members of the party with whom he crossed. At the outbreak of the Civil War he enlisted in the Union army, and served until the close. After the close of the war he engaged in the transfer business here under the name of the Pacific Transfer Company. Later he conducted the Ocean House at Newport, Oregon. He was a member of George Wright Post, G. A. R. Mr. Irwin is survived by D. S. Irwin, of Salem, and S. R. Irwin, of Salem, W. A. Irwin, of Salem, and a daughter."—Corvallis Gazette.

DEATH BY FIRE

Seattle, Wash., Jan. 26.—Fire late last night caused the death of an unknown man, a lodger in the building, severely injured another and destroyed the two-story store and lodging house building owned by ex-Mayor John Nmueller, of Georgetown.

The fire, the cause of which is unknown, originated in the clothing store which occupied the front of the first floor. The man who lost his life was found at the top of the stairway in front of a locked door, leading to a rear stairway. The injured man is Mark Moore, a negro marine.

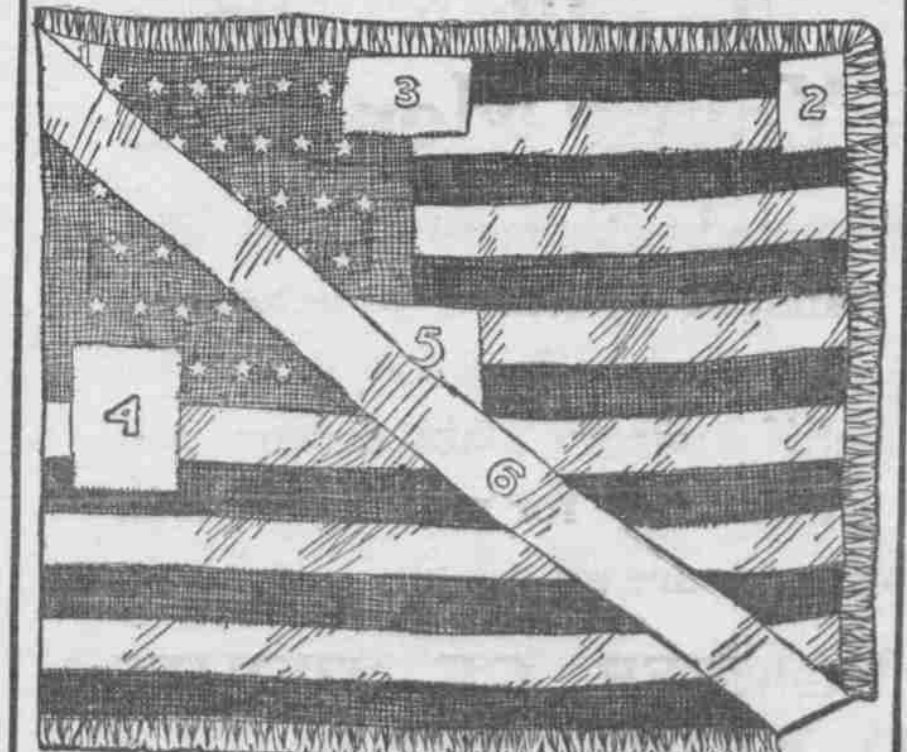
