

HIGH LICENSE OR OUTLAWRY

One of the most important of these is to be prohibition. Years ago our forefathers fought not only for personal liberty, but also for a higher civilization. Prohibition is not only a check on personal liberty, but is also a great backward step in civilization and progress. It is more than that, it is even an insult to every patriotic American citizen to have a law dictate to him what he shall eat or drink.

One of the main arguments of the "prohi" in the coming campaign is the drink bill. The "prohi" sums up this bill and boastfully asks "why this waste?" But is this a waste? Why a waste anymore than the coal bill, theatre bill, soda pop bill or any other bill. The money spent for the drink bill is not lost, on the contrary, it is placed immediately in circulation, to be exact, it is not near as great a waste as the foreign mission bill.

But before we proceed any farther let us see who are the forefathers of this combination, called the Anti-Saloon League. Every public question has an origin, some one or some class has sprung the idea.

The chief instigators of the Anti-Saloon League are the clergymen. Of late years the clergy has stepped into politics, claiming the right to help voice in our great government. Today, in many places, they have com-

plete control of the local government. Why has the church the right to dictate our laws and government, when they contribute not a single cent for their support?

How much taxes do the church and clergy pay toward the maintenance of our nation? Not a single penny.

The church of this great country possess and control millions of dollars worth of untaxed property. Other corporations are obliged to pay tribute, but the churches go scot free Millions of revenue annually lost by this nefarious scheme. The question is: "Why this waste?"

Not only that, but many of our modern churches are used on the side as theaters. A theater is a place of amusement and entertainment. During the theatrical season many road shows, under the guise of a lecture or entertainment, play the different churches. A theater not obliged to pay a license. The church obliged to pay a license. The churches are all right in their places, but when they step out into the business and political world, they should be dealt with the same as any other corporation, business firm or individual. This much for the founders of Prohibition.

On election day, when the laboring man and taxpayer steps up to the polls, amid the prayers and songs of little children, he must not be carried away by emotion but must carefully weigh in the balance "cause and effect."

In voting for state Prohibition, the laboring man votes away his club, the taxpayer burdens himself with additional tax, and the law-abiding citizen paves the way for a natural degeneration and a lower citizenship.

And all for the whims of a class which no toady fails to support this great free American land of ours, but who live mostly from the sweat of the laboring man.

FIERCE GALES PLAY HAVOC

Terrible Gales Prevailing on the Atlantic from Gibraltar to Danish Peninsula.

[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE.] London, Jan. 28.—From reports received today from various points on the west coast of Europe and the shores of the English channel, it is believed that between 300 and 400 lives have been lost at sea in the series of terrible gales that have swept the Atlantic from Gibraltar to the Danish peninsula during the last three days.

The shores of the channel are dotted with wreckage and many bodies have been washed in by the mountainous seas. Hundreds of craft undoubtedly have gone to the bottom.

The channel today is being whipped by one of the fiercest storms that have visited it in many years. Additional death toll undoubtedly will be demanded.

The steamer Laura foundered early today off Curruña, Spain. According to advices received here, her crew of 30 men were drowned.

The Italian steamer Giupuseo was swayed by the waves in the Bay of Biscay near Bilbao, Spain, today. Several sailors were washed overboard before life boats could be lowered.

A British torpedo boat destroyer which broke from its moorings near Dover last night is a total wreck on the beach.

Its crew of 40 men were rescued.

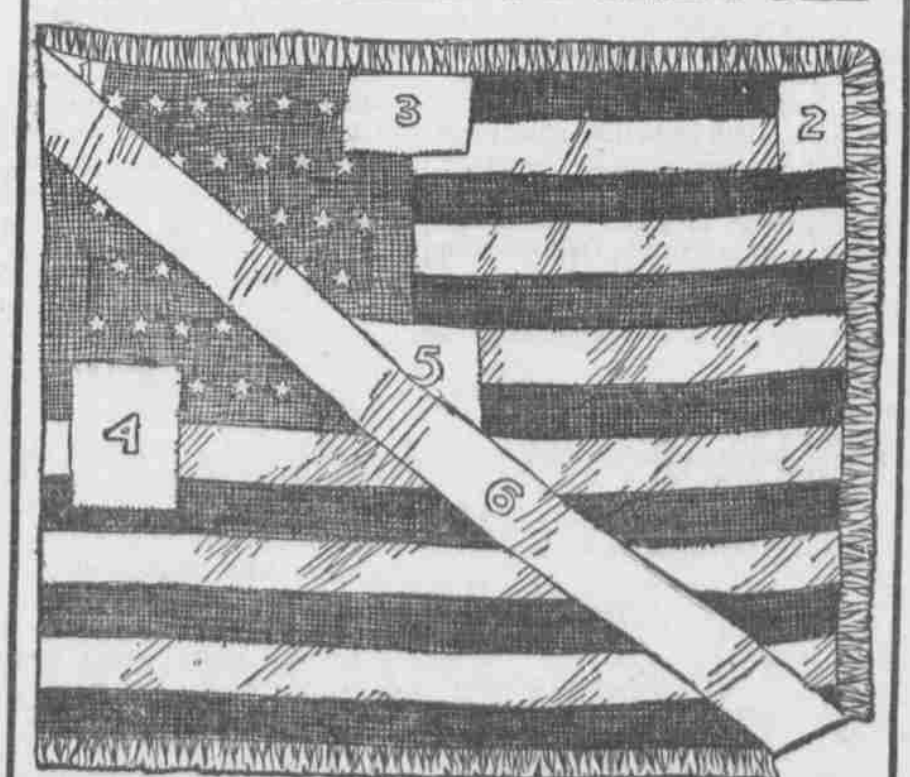

Dr. Boris, an instructor at Harvard, the boy's father, declared his son was too ill to see visitors today. He said he is unable to state when William will be able to return to the university. Physicians visit the lad daily, like Dr. Sidis, however, they refuse to confirm the report that the mental strain of the last year is partially responsible for the collapse.
