WARNS CANNERS

Atlantic City, N. J., Feb. 10.—

Delegates to the National Cannery Association, in convention here, are in receipt of an admonition from Secretary of Agriculture Wilson. The secretary's warning is that the packers and canners should beware of mixing in the controversy over the use of preservatives.

"The packers of canned goods cannot be advantaged by becoming in-

involved in a controversy which has no natural connection with their business," reads the secretary's open letter to the convention.

American goods are the best in the world, and need no preservatives. We know the canners of the country use no preservatives in their goods, and I desire to have conveyed to the organization now in session my hope that the canners will refuse to be made the tools of those interests which are fighting the rulings of the national government under the pure food acts."

ROSELAIR GIVEN NEW LEASE OF LIFE

Hillsboro Murderer Granted Stay of Execution Pending Appeal.

John D. Roselair, the Hillsboro murderer, secured a new lease of life yesterday afternoon when the supreme court granted a stay of execution as to his death sentence pending the appeal of his case before that tribunal. The transcript of appeal had already been filed in the case and yesterday afternoon John Jeffries of Portland appeared before the supreme court and secured a certificate of probable cause of appeal and a stay of execution. The case has not yet been set for argument, but will probably take its regular course on the calendar and may not be heard for a month or so.

Goes Back to Hillsboro. Besides giving to the condemned man a new lease of life the stay of execution means that if he so desire he may return to the Hillsboro county jail during the pendency of the appeal instead of remaining in the death cell of the state penitentiary. But whether his attorney will ask him to return to Hillsboro or have him remain at the state prison had not been decided today. At any rate whether he desires it or not when his appeal is finally determined, whether the one way or the other, he must go back to Hillsboro. In the event that he should win it will be necessary for him to return for a new trial, and should he lose he must return to the circuit court of that place for re-sentence.

The time set for Roselair's execution was tomorrow morning.

SPITZER MUST SERVE TWO YEARS

[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE.] New York, Feb. 10.—Oliver Spitzer, convicted of conspiracy to defraud the government in connection with the weighing of sugar importations, was sentenced today by Federal Judge Martin to serve two years in the federal penitentiary at Atlanta.

Spitzer formerly was superintendent of the American Sugar Refining Company's docks at Williamsburg. With four checkers at the docks he was found guilty by Judge Martin on December 17, 1909.

The checkers were John C. Coyle, Thomas Kehoe, Edward A. Boyle and Patrick J. Henessy. They were sentenced on January 8, 1910 to serve a year in the Blackwell's Island jail.

Because of Spitzer's illness, his sentence was not pronounced at that time, and he was placed under \$10,000 bail.

He appeared before Judge Martin today to learn the penalty he must pay.

Spitzer immediately announced that he will appeal the sentence.

SHIP BAD FRUIT

[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE.] Stockton, Cal., Feb. 10.—Following the discovery that a number of Japanese fruit growers in the San Joaquin valley are causing serious injury to the standard set by the majority of the growers by shipping fruits of low quality under American names, growers here are planning to take some action to put a stop to the practice.

A proposition is being considered today to take the matter before the fruit and grape men, with the view of protecting American growers.

It has been learned that carloads of fruit have been shipped from this valley by the Japanese under fictitious names, and that they were aided by white men to carry out the deception.

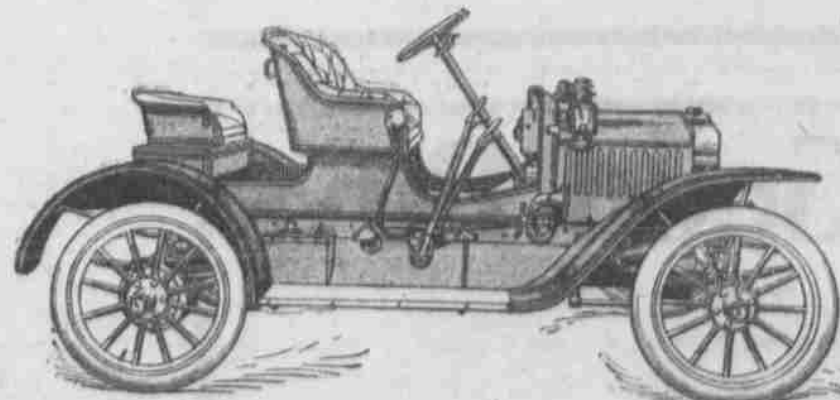
