**THE FALL OF MANAGUA.**

(Continued from page one)

command, and the fall of the capital is deemed inevitable.

It is now apparent that the engagements precipitated by the rebel general, Mena, at LaGarita and Santa Clara were parts of a well laid campaign which Chamorro intends to execute before attacking Managua.

Couriers arriving from Mena's camp today state that at LaGarita the rebels won a decisive victory, but at Santa Clara, they were compelled to retire before the government army to Moogan.

While Mena was operating in the vicinity of LaGarita, Chamorro's division was moving to a position northeast of Managua. It is his intention to approach the city from that direction, attempting to clear that section of the country of the government outposts located there.

This move by Chamorro undoubtedly explains the capture of Matagalpa, capital of the province of Matagalpa, news of which has just reached here.

General Mena's command lost 26 men killed and 60 wounded at Santa Clara, according to the couriers who have arrived here. Among the killed was the rebel General Blandon.

Gabriel Bishop, the Louisianan who was wounded while directing the insurgents artillery corps, was brought here today for treatment. He is suffering from severe abdominal wounds, and his condition is dangerous.

**EX-SECRETARY GARIEFLD WILL GO ON THE STAND**  
Washington, Feb. 11.—James R. Garfield, ex-secretary of the department of the interior will take a prominent part in the Ballinger-Pinchot investigation. Former Chief Forester Gifford Pinchot today requested the committee to subpoena Garfield in order that the former secretary's testimony may be heard by the congressional investigators. Garfield is regarded by many as the leader of the "back from Elba" movement which is designed to place Theodore Roosevelt again in the presidential chair. It is reported also, that he is not a follower of the present administration's policy in regard to conservation of natural resources.  
Frederick H. Newell, head of the reclamation service and Arthur P. Davis, chief engineer of the same service, were also mentioned for subpoena by Pinchot. The chief forester also asked the committee to call for a mass of documents, reports and correspondence in connection with the controversy.
